- Public Works Projects Update – Angel Ferrara stated the Parks and Recreation Department attempted to obtain a project update from Public Works but did not receive any information for October. We will try to get one for the November Park Board meeting
- Angel, did share an update on 8th Street Park and Northrop Park, they're still moving along, with some progress, if you've been by the parks, you can see that they are still under construction, so we're anticipating, at least for Northrop Park, that the playgrounds should be getting installed anytime if they aren't already on site, and then 8th Street Park is still progressing

IV- NEW BUSINESS

- Employee of the Month Recognition –Vincent Billaci shared with the Park Board that the Parks and Recreation Department’s July Employee of the Month is Jeff Robson, who was nominated for his strong work ethic and positive spirit. His position helps with maintaining the Parks & Recreation buildings and keeps up with the Parkwood Pool and splash pads, keeping them in top shape
- Employee of the Month Recognition – Shaya Lockett shared with the Park Board August Employee of the month was Harry Borg, his position is Program Aide, and he is just a willing employee. Anything we've asked him to do, any location we've asked him to work at, he has always stepped in, done so with a smile. As you all are aware, the Recreation Division is currently short-staffed, and Harry often fills in. He was able to oversee our co-ed softball league and be the main employee for the Parks Department for us to keep that program running, and he has always positive attitude
- Employee of the Month Recognition – Vincent Billaci shared with the Park Board that September's Employee of the Month is Timothy Plake, who is nominated for his dedication to beautifying our parks. Tim is a Horticulturists II, with Parks & Recreation. Tim’s efforts have not gone unnoticed, with strong field knowledge, a great work ethic, and a positive attitude

Shaya Lockett - Recreation Updates

- Parks and Recreation, in collaboration with the KCKPD, will host the "Faith in Blue" event this weekend at Eisenhower Park. The event will take place on Saturday, October 11th at 6:00 p.m. There will be a program featuring concessions and several available

various resources. Additionally, a movie screening will begin at 7:00 p.m. Our staff will be present during this community event.

- We are excited to announce that our Fall activities are in full swing! One of the upcoming events is our Pumpkin painting event on October 17th at the Armourdale Community Center. This event has reached full capacity, which is thrilling news. It reflects the growth and success of our program over the past few years. We currently have 35 registered participants, which is the maximum number we can accommodate due to the number of pumpkins and the space needed
- Boo Bingo - is coming up on October 29th at 6:00 p.m. This event will also be at Armourdale Community Center
- Halloween Festival – The Halloween festival will be held on October 31st from 4:30 PM to 7:00 p.m. at Kensington Gym. Our entire recreation team will come together to host this exciting event for the kids. On that day, all community centers will be closed to allow the whole team to participate. We will have hot dogs, popcorn, and various activities planned. Each attendee will receive a tote bag for trick-or-treating, and plenty of candy will be available. Shaya invited the Park Board to join us the festivities!
- Fall sports update: Our volleyball clinic at Joe Amayo and flag football are both ongoing and will wrap up in a couple of weeks
- Futsal registration is open, and will begin on November 1st
- Winter basketball season is approaching; Parks and Recreation is hosting a Volunteer Coaches informational meeting on October 15th, at 6:00 p.m. We will be hosting a call for coaches at Kensington Annex. We often hear from the community about how they can help and support youth sports and becoming a volunteer coach is one of the best ways. If you know anyone interested in coaching, please encourage them to attend the meeting at Kensington on the 15th at 6:00 p.m. If they are unable to participate, you can share my contact information with them, and I will ensure they receive all the necessary details to get started as a coach
- Parks and Recreation is celebrating Walktober to highlight our new trail amenities, this past Friday, we had a ribbon-cutting at Pierson Park for the new trail, splash pad, and dog park
- This Friday, October 10th, at 11:00 a.m., we will cut the ribbon for the new trail at Wyandotte County Park
- On October 17th and 24th, we'll be at Clopper Field and Klammer Park to celebrate additional trail amenities, encouraging everyone to walk and enjoy
- We also partnered with Kansas City, Missouri, and Jackson County Parks for a Walktober event at Kaw Point Park as part of their ongoing series, where artists come

out, and paint the scenery of the park. The event will be on Sunday, October 26th, at noon

Vincent Billaci - Park Updates

- Shared with the Park Board, the Kansas Forest Service had contacted us with another round of funding for the tree grant that they have, for which we received \$100,000 last November.
- We received approval to reapply for this second round, and last month, we were notified that we were awarded another \$100,000 from Kansas Forest Service grants. We are excited to get much-needed tree work and new tree plantings.
- Kensington Park – Shared with the Park Board that the bid process was closed, and the bid has been awarded to Mid -America Gold and Landscape. The construction is now in process; they have already started the trail portion concrete has been poured, and a lot of the grading has been completed, the update on the park will consist of two 12 youth soccer fields, and we will be working on the soccer practice field, along with a 1/3mile walking trail with rubber surfacing. Game fields will be irrigated, and the Musco lighting will be upgraded. This project will be complete and ready for soccer next year
- Wyandotte County Park now has a 0.9-mile walking trail with concrete and rubber surfacing, which was completed
- George Meyn Hall received a huge upgrade on the floor, which is now surfaced with epoxy
- Refreshed the Park Board with this past year's budget process, and towards the tail end of the budget process, the Full Commission was discussing illegal dumping that we are all facing in this city, and one of the primary spots is Kaw Drive between 38th and 59th Street. The County Administrator, David Johnston, is making a huge effort to address all the blight and illegal dumping in the city, he tasked John Kelly in Building Logistics with the coordination that is involved in illegal dumping pickup effort, along with the Street Department and Parks and Recreation, every Monday, we are sending 6 and 8 staff members to assist in illegal dumping, so that takes away our efforts, with the Parks
- Welborn Park – Several months ago, a group of high school students initiated a project as part of their senior assignments. After graduating, they continued to pursue this project, which was inspiring. Vincent wanted to commend Commissioner Dr. Jane Winkler Philbrook for her support; she truly took these students under her wing and guided them throughout the process. Thanks to her efforts, they secured funding from the Park Foundation, applied for, and received a grant from the Hollywood Casino and from the TURF Committee. As a result, the project is now fully funded. We received bids for the project that were lower than expected, giving us potential extra funds. We hope to use this surplus to include dog agility items in the park. Installation of the dog park at Wellburn is set to begin around October 22nd, and we're excited to add this amenity.

Angel Ferrara – Department Updates

- Requested the Park Board to take a drive by Kensington Park, see the transformation being done
- Welborn Dog Park – We asked our Marketing Coordinator, Ethan Haines, to capture the story of how the high school students who presented to the Park Board earlier in the year, and how they have worked diligently to bring the park project to fruition. Dr. Jane Winkler Philbrook also assisted in this effort. Ethan is putting together an article and working on video highlights to showcase this collaboration
- Emerson Park – Gave update on the Emerson Park gazebo, advised maintenance enhancements to the roof that are going to be done, and we're looking at spring construction repair
- Budget was passed in late September, and advised Park Board that she will be bringing some information on what this means for the Parks and Recreation Department for 2026, Parks and Recreation has always received tourism dollars, through the TGT tax, and, more specifically, through this conversation, there is a proposal to increase the TGT tax from 8% to 10%, which would provide an additional 3% dedicated to Parks and Recreation, amounting to approximately \$1.8 million. This item was supposed to be discussed at the full commission meeting last Thursday, was postponed to November 6th. Angel stated she plan to attend and appreciated Mario Escobar and Amanda DeVriese-Sebilla for sending letters in support of the Parks and Recreation Department
- A few members of the Parks and Recreation staff recently attended the National Recreation Association conference in Orlando. During this event, Shaya, one of our consultants, and I had the opportunity to present for the first time on the topic titled "The History of Parkwood Pool and Its Role in Resiliency." We would like to present to the Park Board in the November meeting
- The Parks and Recreation department received a \$175,000 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for Parkwood Pool maintenance and repairs, approved earlier this spring. We are matching this with our available budget dollars, making it a 50/50 grant match. Our department is spearheading this project and is going to apply for another round of the Recreation and Trail Program grant, which is administered through KDWP, also from the National Park Service. We applied for an RTP grant last year, we received approval for those dollars, and they are currently being deployed at Kensington Park, and have a mix of Congressional Earmark dollars and a small portion of recreational trail program dollars for the trail portion being constructed at Kensington. The total project at Kensington is estimated to be 1% might come from general funds, predominantly grant-funded. a million dollars, and it's fully grant-funded

- Shared update on Parks and Recreation hiring process for the department. As the Unified Government had a freeze on hiring this year, we have received guidance, and we will slowly fill some of the positions

VI - BOARD MEMBER'S QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS

- Dr. Jane Winkler Philbrook – Asked, since Parks and Recreation has changed to a five-day work week at the community center, if this will have more applicants
 - Shaya Lockett – Answered, yes, once we implemented the 5-day work week for the recreation staff, we did see an increase in hiring. We have been able to successfully retain new hires, whereas before, we weren't having success
- Karen Daniels – Wanted to thank the Parks and Recreation again how Boston Daniels Park and all the hard work on the transformation. Karen also wanted to know how to bring some of the recreation events to the Beatrice L. Lee Community Center
 - Shaya Lockett – Answered that the recreation department just had a meeting today and agreed that all of the community centers should have a similar level of programming. We are working with our staff on how to reach out to organizations and community partners that can assist
- Mario Escobar – Asked Vincent Billaci if Vega Park will get a new tree planted, due to the tree that was there prior in the park had to be taken out
 - Vincent Billaci – Stated he didn't have the list of the thirteen parks that will get trees planted, using the tree grant that the Kansas Forest Service has given; he will check and will send out the list of parks

Unified Government-Owned Building and Park Renaming Policy

1. Policy

It is the policy of the Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas that the naming of new and renaming of existing city-owned buildings and parks be reserved for exceptional circumstances and that the naming process comply with the guidelines and procedures set forth in this policy. This policy applies to name proposals by citizens.

2. Objective

To establish a systematic and consistent approach for the official naming of city- and county-owned buildings and parks.

To establish a policy that considers community tradition and continuity of name, while using established criteria that emphasize geography, local history, community character and values and service to Wyandotte County in the naming or renaming of buildings and parks.

3. Principles

Naming or renaming city buildings and parks is a powerful way to preserve local history and express community ideals and values. The names of city buildings and parks tell the important stories of our community. Naming a building or park after someone or something is an honor to be conferred thoughtfully and cautiously, with an opportunity for input from the whole community.

The Unified Government reserves the naming or renaming of buildings and parks for circumstances which assure a worthy and enduring legacy and serve the best interests of Wyandotte County. To that end, the following broad categories of naming requests will be considered:

- **Exceptional Individuals**
- **Historic Events, Places, and Persons**
- **Major Gifts**

4. Criteria

In considering any proposal to name or rename a city-owned park or building, the following non-exclusive list of criteria should be considered.

General Criteria

- Will the name have historical, cultural, and social significance for generations to come?
- Will the name memorialize people, places, or events that are of enduring importance to the community?
- Will the name be identified with some major achievement or advancement of the public good within the community or the nation?
- Will the name be particularly suitable for the building or park based on the location or history of the building, park, or surrounding neighborhood?
- Will the name have symbolic value that transcends its ordinary meaning or use and enhance the character and identity of the building or park?
- Will a name that accompanies a corporate give result in the undue commercialization of the building or park?

Criteria for names honoring individual people:

- Naming after a person should not occur until the person has been deceased for at least eighteen (18) months or reached the age of 75 years and that person's historical significance and good reputation have been secured in the history and lore of the community or the nation.
- Priority for naming after persons should be given in the following order to those who have significant and lasting contributions
 - To Wyandotte County
 - To the Kansas City metropolitan area
 - To the nation
- Naming after national or international figures should be rare and only upon a substantial demonstration of the figure's connections to or special importance to the Wyandotte County community.
- Naming after people or groups of people who perish in or survive a tragic event should be considered only well after the public shock generated by the tragic event has lessened. Emphasis should be placed on the contributions or heroic actions of these people during their lifetime, rather than the circumstances of their death or survivorship.

Criteria for names memorializing historic events, places, and persons:

- The building or park should be located near or otherwise associated with the events, places, and people after whom it will be named.
- The connection between the building or park and the historic event, place, or person should be documented with research.
- The historic event, place, or person should be significant to the community and the community should desire to commemorate the history, as demonstrated by comments at public hearing.

Criteria for names for major gifts:

- Generally, the donation of gifts should be reward in itself and should not come with an expectation of commemoration through the naming or renaming of a public facility.
- The following should be considered as thresholds for the naming of a public facility in commemoration of a gift:

- Donation of the land upon which the park or building sits
- Payment of capital costs for construction
- Long-term endowment for maintenance
- The provision of significant program costs that serve community needs
- Names for major gifts that are also names for individuals should comply with the criteria for names honoring individual people.

5. Disqualifying Factors

Name proposals that contain any of the following will be denied by the Unified Government without public hearing.

- The applicant proposes to name the building or park after him or herself or his or her own group, business, or association, unless the proposal meets the criteria for names for major gifts.
- The proposed name duplicates the name of another UG building, park or park feature
- The proposed name denigrates or advocates a specific religious belief
- The proposed name has obscene connotations
- The proposed name demeans, intimidates, or maliciously portrays any racial or ethnic group
- The proposed name is the name of an individual who has been found guilty of a felony crime

6. Renaming

Proposals to **rename** parks and buildings are not encouraged and should be entertained only after fully investigating and considering the potential impact of removing the current name. Names that have become ingrained or widely accepted in the community should not be abandoned unless there are compelling reasons and strong public sentiment for doing so. Historical or commonly-used place names should be preserved wherever possible.

The exception to the general rule that renaming is discouraged is renaming a building to remove the name of a person or entity who has acted in a disreputable or criminal way. In those circumstances, renaming will be considered favorably.

7. Procedure for Community or Citizen Requests to Name or Rename a Park or Building

Name proposals shall be submitted to the City Clerk at 701 N. 7th Street, Kansas City, Kansas 66101.

1. The applicant shall submit a name proposal to the Unified Government. The proposals must include the following:
 - a. The location of the building or park to be named or renamed.
 - b. The reasons for the proposed name, including any relevant research or documentation.
 - c. Community support for the proposed name by including a petition with the required number of signatures, as listed below. The signatures must include the name, age (must be 18 or older), address, zip code, and telephone number of each signer. Each signer must be a resident of Wyandotte County.

- i. For neighborhood and pocket parks, the petition must have 200 signatures with zip codes within a 3-mile radius of the park.
 - ii. Neighborhood community centers require 300 signatures with zip codes within a 3-mile radius of the building.
 - iii. Community parks will require 500 signatures.
 - iv. Community buildings of city-wide will require 1,000 signatures.
 - v. Regional parks will require 1,000 signatures.
- 2. The department will review the petition and the application. If the petition or application do not meet the above requirements or contains one of the disqualifying factors listed in subsection 5, it will be rejected and the applicant will be informed within 30 days.
- 3. If the application meets the threshold requirements, the director of the department will arrange for a public hearing on the name proposal.
 - a. Name Proposals for *Parks or Buildings controlled or maintained by the Parks Department*
 - i. Name proposals for parks will go before the Board of Parks Commissioners first. At least two weeks before the meeting, notice of the hearing will be published in the official newspaper informing the public of the name proposal and publicizing the public's right to comment on the proposal at the hearing. The Board of Parks Commissioners shall consider public comments, the principles and criteria in this policy, and any other relevant factors and make a recommendation to the Public Works and Safety Standing Committee to either approve or deny the proposal.
 - ii. Name proposals for parks will then go to the Public Works and Safety Standing Committee. Again, the public will have the opportunity to comment on the name proposal. The Public Works and Safety Standing Committee will consider public comments, the principles and criteria in this policy, and any other relevant factors, and the recommendation of the Board of Parks Commissioners and recommend approval or denial to the full commission.
 - iii. If approved by standing committee, the name proposal will then go to the Full Commission for consideration.
 - b. Name Proposals for *City- and County-Owned Buildings*
 - i. Name proposals for city-owned buildings will first go to the Public Works and Safety Standing Committee. The Unified Government will publish notice of the name proposal and the public hearing at least two weeks before the hearing in the official newspaper. The public will have the opportunity to comment on the name proposal. The Public Works and Safety Standing Committee will consider public comments, the criteria and principles listed in this policy, and any other relevant factors, and vote to approve or deny the proposal.
 - ii. The name proposal will then go to the Full Commission for consideration.
- 4. If the name proposal is approved, the Commission will pass a resolution name or renaming the building or park. The applicant will be informed in writing within 30 days.

The Unified Government will be responsible for the cost of any signage changes as a result of the resolution.

8. Procedure for the Mayor to Request to Name or Rename a Park or Building

Name proposals shall be submitted to the UG Clerk to be placed on the Mayor's Agenda to go to the Full Commission for consideration at the next available Full Commission meeting.

9. Procedure for a Commissioner to Request to Name or Rename a Park or Building

Name proposals shall be submitted to the UG Clerk to be placed on the agenda of the Public Works and Safety Standing Committee for consideration at the next available meeting of the committee.
