STANDING COMMITTEE MINUTES
Monday, October 21, 2019**

The meeting of the Administration and Human Services Standing Committee was held on Monday, October 21, 2019, at 6:35 p.m., in the 5th Floor Conference Room of the Municipal Office Building. The following members were present: Commissioner Markley, Chairman; Commissioners Johnson, Kane and Bynum. Commissioner Philbrook was absent. The following officials were also in attendance: Misty Brown, Deputy Chief Counsel; Alan Howze, and Emerick Cross, Assistant County Administrators; Terry Brecheisen, Director of Public Health; Wesley McCain, Health Department; Officer Cahill, Police Department; and Jay Doleshal Sergeant-at-Arms.

Chairman Markley called the meeting to order. Roll call was taken and all members were present as shown above.

Approval of standing committee minutes from June 17, 2019. **On motion of Commissioner Johnson, seconded by Commissioner Kane**, the minutes were approved.

Committee Agenda:

Item No. 1 – 19981...GRANT: CHIP COORDINATION

Synopsis: Request to submit a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Coordination Grant application, and accept if awarded, from the Health Forward Foundation in the amount of \$174,000, submitted by Terry Brecheisen, Director of Public Health. The in-kind match will be provided by staff.

Terry Brecheisen, Director of Public Health, said I am here with Wesley McCain this evening and he was instrumental in writing the grant that we're asking approval to accept the funds if awarded. Wesley is the head of our Community Health Division at the Health Department. The grant is very straightforward. It's just to provide coordination for the Community Health

Improvement Plan from the different supporting agencies, the key agencies in town and providing a full-time person at the Health Department to provide the overall coordination as we work with the other agencies.

Action: **Commissioner Johnson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Bynum, to approve.** Roll call was taken and there were four “Ayes,” Johnson, Kane, Bynum, Markley.

Item No. 2 – 19987...ORDINANCE: AMENDING THE UNLAWFUL DUMPING ORDINANCE

Synopsis: An ordinance amendment offering a reward of \$250 to any person that provides information materially contributing to a conviction of unlawful dumping, amending Section 31-12, submitted by Daniel Kuhn, Assistant Counsel.

Chairman Markley said I am really excited about this. I have some neighborhood groups and I told them I expect to be giving them a check any day now. I want them to jump all over this.

Daniel Kuhn, Assistant Counsel, said Officer Cahill approached me with an idea for this ordinance. I wish I could take the credit, but I can’t. I’ll turn it over to him.

Officer Cahill said I just want to thank you for hearing this idea this evening. This isn’t a solution for everything with illegal dumping; it’s just a tool. What we’re proposing is that the ordinance be changed where if someone is a witness to somebody dumping illegally and it is deemed fit by a municipal judge, that they could receive a \$250 reward for that. The question usually comes up, where does the money come from. We would like to see it as part of the fine that the person who is the suspect would have to pay the reward for the person who actually turns them in. That’s where we’re thinking the money would come from.

The UG pays a large amount of money cleaning up trash in the breeze across the road, up and down the streets. All neighborhoods are affected by this. I just think it is a tool that would help us. I’ve been investigating illegal dumping for several months since I’ve been in

Community Policing. We're working on new ideas. There are several cities that have an ordinance that's kind of like this. I don't have a lot of research on that to see the numbers and how successful it is.

The graffiti ordinance that we have currently does have a \$250 reward in it, and a lot of money doesn't get paid out of that currently, I understand. I believe with illegal dumping it is a tool that we can use where if the public is educated on it and the potential suspect who is going to illegal dump knows that if somebody sees them they can receive money from turning them in, that it might be a deterrent. That's something that we could go to social media, some of our billboards, some of our advertisements, things like that. I have no idea of what the affects of this would be. There's no way to track that. There's no way to know. It's just a tool that, I think, would assist in the—come with combatting illegal dumping and the challenges that it brings.

Mr. Kuhn said, Commissioners, as a point of clarification. I'm afraid we cannot actually do the funding for this through a fine. Speaking with the Finance Department, it would come through others; money in community programs where there's typically a surplus that should be able to cover any rewards that would be offered.

Commissioner Bynum said just a quick comment. I appreciate, again, your thinking about a tool in the tool box. I know that you probably spend a lot of your time trying to think well, what could we do that might be a little different to combat a certain issue. I'm appreciative of the effort. I'm looking forward to collecting my \$250. I live in an area where we have quite a bit of dumping. Nothing would make me happier than to have someone be convicted of that dumping that occurs in my area on a fairly regular basis. I just wanted to say thank you for thinking about something that you're dealing with all the time in maybe a new way.

Action: **Commissioner Johnson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Bynum, to approve.**

Chairman Markley said a shout out to Don and Joyce Lawrence and Morris, keep chasing down those dumpers. You're gonna get money now.

Synopsis: Appearance of Ron Kelsey requesting that Planned Parenthood Great Plains or any related organization not be allowed to open a location in Kansas City, KS.

Ron Kelsey, KCK, said I am proud to be a KCK resident. I'm actually in Commissioner Kane's district. I'm also the president of Planned Parenthood Exposed. Planned Parenthood Exposed is a non-profit corporation dedicated to educating the public about planned parenthood. I would like to begin by thanking commissioners and other officials for your service to our community here in Wyandotte County/KCK.

As a KCK resident, I am very happy to live here. I'm also grateful for the opportunity to address you regarding the efforts to stop Planned Parenthood from opening an abortion clinic in Kansas City, Kansas.

We know that Planned Parenthood is interested in opening up an abortion clinic in KCK from more than one source. One, Planned Parenthood had a lease on the property at 1854 Minnesota Avenue, which was canceled in September according to the building owners. Two, on September 10th, Planned Parenthood stated at a public meeting in KCK that they were planning on a location within two miles of downtown KCK. Three, on October 2nd, Planned Parenthood stated that the state of Kansas. Special Committee on Judiciary meeting that they had talked with "partners in the community," and that Planned Parenthood was excited about exploring options to open a location in Wyandotte County.

Missouri has strong laws regulating abortion and Planned Parenthood has reacted to this with a new Illinois mega abortion clinic that is Planned Parenthood's east bookend to what I'm calling the west bookend is their KCK location with Missouri having strict regulations on abortions and that, Planned Parenthood has put in place to bookend Missouri with abortion clinics. The people

from across Kansas and Missouri and other states would now come to KCK for abortions. Note that Planned Parenthood used a shell company in Illinois to hide its intentions during construction. That's silly.

Certainly, we strongly object to Planned Parenthood and its abortion business. We must never forget that abortion is a killing of innocent human beings; innocent unborn children. We should not want the businesses that participate in this to locate in our community. Fortunately, abortions among Wyandotte County residents have dropped 50% since 2006. They've gone from 749 in 2006 to 352 in 2017, according to the state of Kansas Department of Health and Environment Vital Statistics. An abortion clinic in KCK is going to reverse this positive trend.

As horrific as the killing of unborn children is, this is not the only strong objection that we have with Planned Parenthood. Planned Parenthood embraces ideology that accepts and promotes virtually any kind of sexual activity as normal to our youth.

I believe this book titled *It's Perfectly Normal* to be child pornography. This is listed on Planned Parenthood's website under books for children. I'm uncomfortable with discussing the pictures and the contents of this book with you adults, yet, this book is targeted to children aged 10 and up. I will quote just one sentence from the book, "Sexual intercourse, having sex, can involve the penis and the vagina or the mouth and the genitals or the penis in the anus." Again, 10-years olds. I will leave three copies of this book for you to review, and I will also mail you some YouTube points on Planned Parenthood's public and explicit promotions of sex. These videos will shock you.

We can learn much about Planned Parenthood by absorbing what they do not talk about. They do not emphasize virtues such as modesty, sexual purity, faith, abstinence and saving sex until marriage. Instead, they prey upon the innocence of our youth.

With abortion, Planned Parenthood emphasizes, my body, my choice. They ignore the body of the unborn human being. They promote intentional and violent killing of innocent human beings. Planned Parenthood kills over 300,000 unborn children in the United States each year. Planned Parenthood emphasizes the prevention to pregnancies and STDs at the same time they promote sexual activity. They fail to emphasize the inadequacies of the prevention methods that they promote and thereby create a sense of false confidence in our youth.

Planned Parenthood claims to be the largest sex educator in the United States. The result of

it's education and epidemic levels of STDs nationwide, especially among teens, sex education is not working.

We've encouraged the UG's public Health Department to emphasize the value of abstinence in its prevention efforts. Certainly, common sense would strongly suggest that this should be a major focus to help our community. We should explore legal ways to exclude Planned Parenthood from our community; however, if we cannot legally exclude Planned Parenthood, we should use all available ordinances to regulate them. Additionally, can we create any new ordinances as part of a new KCK zoning rewrite?

In summary, this boils down to the values that we want to embrace in our community. As leaders, you are in position of influence to help determine our values. In our democratic republic, values are debated and in competition with other values. It is up to we, the people, as to which values prevail. Ultimately, someone's values are adopted in laws and regulations, but these should not be the values of Planned Parenthood. To promote positive values, Kansas City Pregnancy Clinic has recently been incorporated and we'll locate at Mercy and Truth at 721 N. 31st St. after adequate funding has been raised.

Finally, we respectfully request that the UG, Mayor and each commissioner state publicly that they do not want Planned Parenthood within our community.

Chairman Markley called the meeting to order. Roll call was taken and all members were present as shown above.

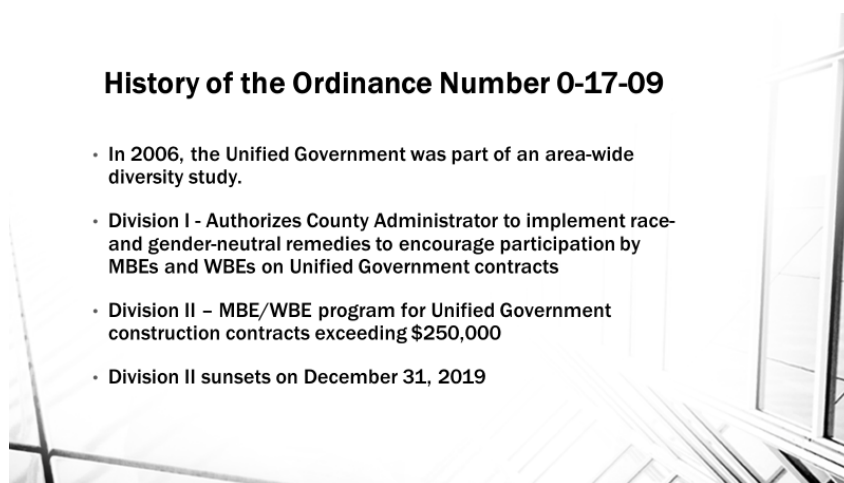

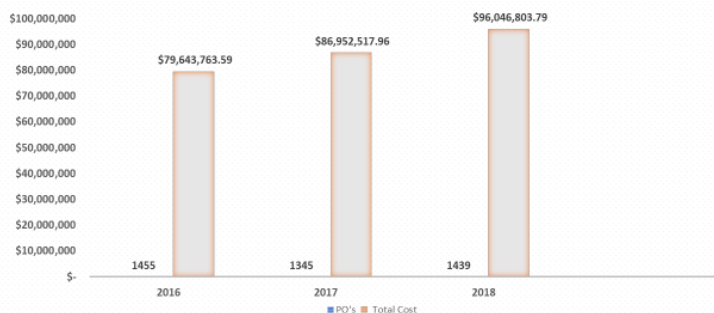
Sharon Reed, Procurement Manager, said I'm here with Richard Rocha, Diversity Coordinator. We're here today to explain the sunset of the Division II ordinance, December 31, 2019, and to facilitate some of the information on how we plan to continue to reach those goals. Richard will go through the PowerPoint.



Richard Rocha, Diversity Coordinator, said this is the history of Ordinance O-17-09. It was effective in 2006 when the Unified Government required the area-wide diversity study. As you can tell, it has gone up to the II Division as well. The MBE/WBE program for the Unified Government for a construction contract exceeding \$250,000. We bring this up because Division II sunsets at the end of this year on December 31, 2019.

Procurement Total Cost Analysis 2016 - 2018

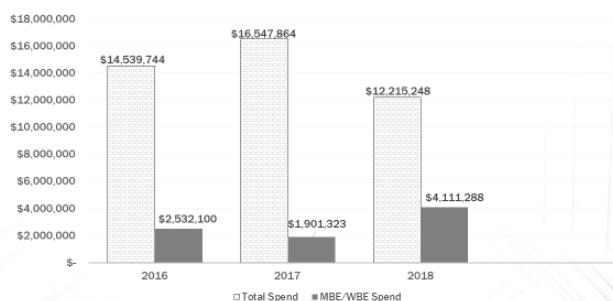


You can see here, this is what our total procurement cost is. These are all purchase orders that we do out of the Procurement Department. The lower number on the bottom is the number of the purchase order, and the number on top is the total cost to what we use in the Procurement Department.

Commissioner Bynum said, I'm sorry, Mr. Rocha. What you're saying is \$96M, for example, in 2018 was the total price of the business the Unified Government did. **Ms. Reed** said the total, yes, ma'am. **Commissioner Bynum** said thank you.

Public Works Construction Projects

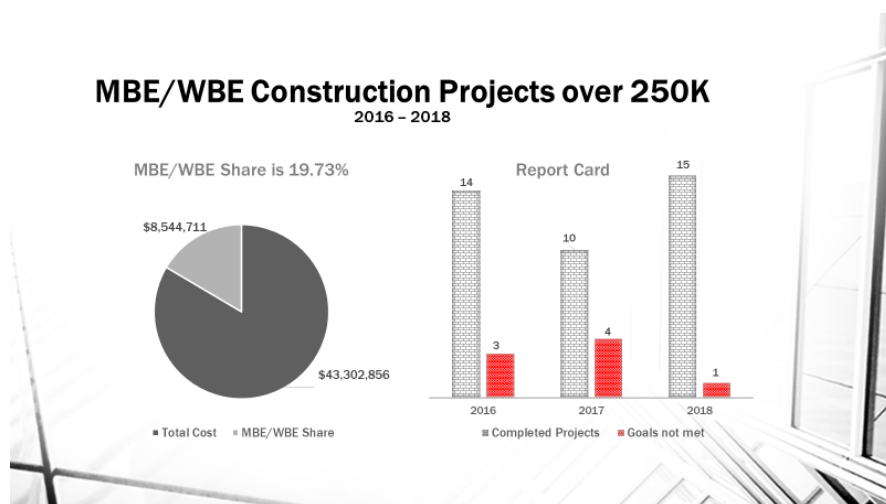
* over \$250K



For the Public Works construction projects over \$250,000, as you can see, in 2016, the cost is there, the cost of 2017 as well, and the cost of 2018. 2019 is not on there because there's still seven or eight projects that are still in the process right now. As you can see, on the bottom is

what the total Public Works construction costs is, and on the lower box you can see what the MBE/WBE spends.



On our MBE/WBE construction projects over \$250,000, as you can see, in the last three years from 2016 to 2018, 19% of our funding has gone to MBE/WBE.

On our report card in 2016, we had 14 projects. Three did not meet the goal. In 2017, we had 10 projects; 4 did not meet the goal. In 2018, we had 15 projects and only one didn't meet the goal.

Commissioner Johnson asked are those the ones that did not meet. Is that in addition to the ones that did meet or is that just included in those? In other words, of the 14, 3 did not meet. Is that 3 on top of the 14 or is that part of the 14? **Mr. Rocha** said that's the total. There's 3 out of the 14. **Commissioner Johnson** said out of the 14. Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Rocha said on the percentages that you see there, the 3, the 4, and the 1; the 3 in 2016 and the 4 in 2017, we did an average and there were less than 2% that missed their goal. The one for 2018, we realized on that goal, it was sent out to seven MBE/WBE companies. All seven bids came in extremely higher than what the lowest bid could beat. That's the only reason why we didn't reach goal in 2018.

Obstacles

- No current disparity study information available for KCK
- Accounting system is not a reporting tool, Only data on construction projects over 250k is reported
- MBE/WBE/LBE/SBE spend information is not available except for construction projects.

The obstacles we have here. We have no current disparity study in Wyandotte County, KCK. Our accounting system is not a reporting tool; therefore, the only data we report is on any construction over \$250,000. As of right now, only the MBE/WBE/LBE/SBE that send information is not available except for construction projects.

Plan Going Forward

- Implement meaningful remedies to increase participation by MBE/WBE/LBE/SBE on UG contracts.
- Continue the MBE/WBE/LBE/SBE subcontracting goals for construction projects \$250K or more for the next three years
- Continue the Good Faith Efforts to meet goals

Our plan in going forward, we'd like to implement meaningful remedies to increase participation on MBE/WBE/LBE on UG contracts. We continue the MBE/WBE/LBE subcontracting goals for construction projects for \$250,000 and up for the next three years. We continue to use the good faith effort to meet goals.

Community Outreach

- Be Transparent
- Be a partner and participate for our community, encourage conversation.

- Host outreach events, training sessions and seminars

As far as how we do this, this is our community outreach. We want to be as transparent as possible. We want to be a partner and participate for our community, encourage conversation. We invite it new customers, new businesses to come into our office. We want them to sit down with us. We want to explain to them exactly the rules and regulations and how they can get jobs here with the Unified Government.

We want to educate and offer opportunities to small business enterprises and contracting opportunities. We've hosted a couple of outreach events. We've had a couple of vendor fairs over at Memorial Hall. We had 88 companies, different vendors from Wyandotte County that came in. We had over 400 people show up for that event as well.

We still want to continue to hold training sessions and seminars. We'd like to provide a little bit more resources for small and disadvantage businesses who need help to obtain city contracts.

Commissioner Bynum said if I could just wrap it up in my head. The way I understand it, the current ordinance expires next month. We know we need a diversity study. We know it's too expensive so we're going to join with KCMO, but that's not going to happen until 2023, 2021 or 2023, whichever comes sooner. We're going to meanwhile impose our own goals on ourselves, if you will. We're going to voluntarily continue the outreach and participation that we seek that was within the ordinance. I know that, and I appreciate the small business liaison because that was one of the things I was hoping to hear you say is one of the tactics we will use is through our Economic Development Department.

I think you know that whatever we can do to also drive people to sign up, As you know, we've talked about this and we've met about this to sign up to receive the notifications. The more we can drive that website out and whatever we can do to help you, we want to be able to do that. This is really important.

Lastly, you'll keep your own records the best way you're able, I guess, in the same way you are now because you're saying we still don't have the software needed. You'll continue to work on the recordkeeping the way you do now. Could we maybe in a six or nine month time period come back and just hear from you about how it's going? Are we being successful with staying in compliance even though the ordinance itself has expired?

Commissioner Johnson said with regard to the system that we would need to track that, do you have any sense of how much that will cost? **Ms. Reed** said currently we are in the factfinding mode. We've looked at SideSoft which was about \$20,000. We looked at Prism which would be about \$45,000, and we're also working with Workday which would be a complete EFP system. There are several software that we are currently looking at.

Commissioner Johnson asked will you all be at some point be making a recommendation to us about a system. How do we need to go through that process? I think it's something that we need to give some weight to in terms of when and how. I know we got a budget for next year or whatever, but I think that—I don't think we need to be kind of just out in the wind with regard to this. I think we need to have something that is measurable and something that we can trust going forward on that. That's one issue.

Melissa Sieben, Assistant County Administrator, said I just wanted to speak to the commissioner's question. We are looking at this as a UG-wide team. Sharon eluded to a couple of options that we have, but that's where we're at working as quickly as possible. This does, obviously, impact operations in a variety of different ways on the data collection component and how we are able to pull data outside of the \$250,000 and up projects that we have. It's absolutely something that we're working on. We will be back to you, hopefully, within the next six - nine months, as someone stated, over here to be able to give you an update on how we intend to solve this problem.

Commissioner Johnson said nine months is a little too much. I think we need to be—we've been kind of out there for awhile. Since I've been on the Commission, I've had conversations about this. It gets very nebulous. I think we need to put a little bit of heat on that. I think in the world in which we live, and certainly with regard to the community that we are, I think it would behoove us to put a little bit more—make that sooner than nine months. I'd like to see it within the next six months.

A second thing is, I'm just on wordsmitting when I saw diversity strategy. I was thinking about more of human resources so maybe we can call this a supplier diversity or something like that or whatever the new fangled word is now. They change it every once in awhile, so whatever that is.

Commissioner Kane said the reason we did this in 2006 is we wanted to put our local people to work. The casino was a perfect example. They exceeded what their goal was by an astronomical number. I think Commissioner Johnson is correct. I think this is something we need to add to this budget so we can plan the amount of money they're going to need to perform this function.

The sunset was put there so we would do exactly what you're doing. They come back, look at it, revise the mistakes, improve where we're really good, get better where we weren't, and that was the plan all along, to put more people that live here to work here. This works. It was the brain child of Nathan and a couple of them. There was some interesting conversation to go along with it, but the passion was for the people in Wyandotte County. I think that should be—it was a goal then. I believe it's our goal now and we need to prepare for this budget to make some adjustments for these folks.

Commissioner Markley said I think it would be interesting to see of those that did not meet the goal whether there is similarity in the type of projects or the type of problems that they encountered so we can see if there is a solution or additional resources we can provide.

Commissioner Kane said when they found out the ones they were having problems with, they fixed it. I think that's huge. The ones that didn't get it fixed, didn't come back. There was some work that could have been had if they didn't meet the number, so don't go back to them. I think the numbers look pretty good. Some of them missed it for just minute reasons. I think we

have to keep that in mind too. Some of them missed it by a mile so we didn't go back to them. When we can go and say they missed it by this or we submitted some 20 and we didn't get enough back, because that happens too. It's a great tool. By the numbers, you can see we went from 15 down to 1 this year. That's awesome.

Chairman Markley asked additional questions, comments. This was your last slide, right? We didn't disrupt you, did we? **Ms. Reed** said this was it.

Chairman Markley said this is for information only. There's not a new ordinance on the table, but this presentation is telling us we're our internal operations. I don't think we need a motion. It sounds like we may hear more about it during budget period. **Ms. Sieben** said there's a lot of movement underway so, I guarantee you there's something coming real soon.

Ms. Reed said to let you know, we are working diligently to get you that information, and we continue the good faith effort with the vendors and making great strides.

Item No. 2 – 191056...APPEARANCE: KYRA LAMPE

Synopsis: Appearance of Kyra Lampe to oppose a Planned Parenthood facility in Kansas City, Kansas.

Kyra Lampe said I'm currently in Manhattan, KS, for school but I'm originally from Jetmore, KS. I just want to thank you for letting me be here to speak. I'm here to serve as a voice of

concern and opposition to Planned Parenthood moving into Kansas City, Kansas. I'm here representing Cats For Life at Kansas State University. I serve as the Vice President of Cats For Life and also as the Kansas Co-State Captain for Students For Life of America. Cats For Life is one of 1,200 chapters of Students For Life of America, otherwise known as SFLA.

SFLA is a non-profit organization dedicated to ending abortion by educating students and working to cultivate and train young pro-life leaders. I brought along another young activist to show our dedication and support for the pro-life cause.

It is my understanding that Planned Parenthood is currently looking for a location to build here in the area. I strongly urge you to prevent this from happening. Coming from a young female student, we can do better than Planned Parenthood. Kansas City does not need a Planned Parenthood for a number of reasons. One, there is already a facility in nearby Overland Park. Two, and most importantly, Planned Parenthood facilities are not beneficial, but, in fact, very harmful to the well-being of women and communities.

Right next door in Overland Park, a Planned Parenthood has been cited and failed numerous inspections. According to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, these citations include: failure to ensure that all employees are up-to-date with TB tests and immunizations, properly billing Medicaid, and failing to inform patients of any of their rights and other required disclosures so patients are being deceived and are not receiving the high-quality care that they deserve. In fact, right here in your neighborhood, there are multiple federally qualified health centers that offer higher quality care at more affordable costs as opposed to Planned Parenthood.

For example, according to freeclinics.org, there are seven free medical clinics in Kansas City alone. To top this off, there are 15 pregnancy resource centers or maternity homes that provide ultrasounds, pregnancy tests, STI testing, job counseling, and other support in the areas. There are existing resources that are available to people that offer all of the services and more that Planned Parenthood does; all are not performing abortions.

Furthermore, Planned Parenthood is simply a bad investment for our communities. Planned Parenthood itself reported that its number of beneficial services such as breasts exams, pap tests, pre-natal care, colonoscopies, and HPV treatments have been declining since 2006. Yet, the number of abortions performed annually continues to rise. What is most alarming about this is that even though these beneficial services are in fact in decline, the tax revenue, the money

that we pay going into Planned Parenthood continues to increase annually. While Planned Parenthood claims that none of our tax dollars fund abortions, they are keeping these facilities open so that more abortions are performed, and more patients are hurt by the failure of these facilities to uphold and provide basic medical care. We are continuing to invest our tax dollars into an organization that continually suggest that abortion is not its number one priority. We are seeing our tax dollars go to an organization that is offering more and more abortions and less and less actually medically necessary procedures.

While Planned Parenthood may not be successful at providing proper health care, it is successful at tarnishing the image of a community. Throughout its history, it has been the center of one scandal after another including: selling fetal body parts, covering up statutory rape and sex trafficking, and as mentioned previously, continuing failing inspections surrounding health and safety violations.

The bottom line is that Kansas City does not need Planned Parenthood. I do not just speak from my own perspective. I have here with me over 500 signatures of individuals who are opposed to the facility moving into the city. I speak for many people when I say that Kansas City does not need or want a Planned Parenthood. I strongly urge you to prevent it from coming into this community. Thank you.
