The Unified Government Commission of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas, met in a Special Meeting, Thursday, March 19, 2020, with eleven members present. The commissioners were present by telephone and the Mayor was present in person: Bynum, Commissioner At-Large First District; Burroughs, Commissioner At-Large Second District; Townsend, Commissioner First District; McKiernan, Commissioner Second District; Ramirez, Commissioner Third District; Johnson, Commissioner Fourth District (joined at 5:06 p.m.); Kane, Commissioner Fifth District; Markley, Commissioner Sixth District; Walters, Commissioner Seventh District; Philbrook, Commissioner Eighth District; and Alvey, Mayor/CEO, presiding. MAYOR'S AGENDA

Mayor Alvey said our first order of business is a resolution to extend the state of local health emergency for the COVID-19 pandemic for Wyandotte County through May 18th. Doug, would you just give a description why this is necessary.

Doug Bach, County Administrator, said the extension of the local emergency was one that was first declared by the Mayor last week under his authority. It is one he can do for a period of seven days. He can continue that in increments; however, we felt as this is going to continue forward for a number of weeks we put this before the governing body and ask for you to go ahead and make this declaration for a period of 60 days.

ADMINISTRATOR'S AGENDA

Item No. 1 – 2059...ORDINANCE: ORDERS BY HEALTH OFFICER OR BOARD OF HEALTH

Synopsis: An ordinance relating to the violation of an order by the Local Health Officer or Board of Health, adding new Section 17-7 to the Code of Ordinances, submitted by Doug Bach, County administrator.

Mayor Alvey said the first item is an ordinance relating to violation of orders. This is not a violation by the Local Health Officer or the Board of Health. It is related to what their action responses would be when there is a violation of orders. Is that correct Ken? **Ken Moore, Chief Legal Counsel**, said that's correct. This ordinance allows us to prosecute in Municipal Court and also it facilitates the Police Department and the Sheriff Department when actually issuing a citation for a violation of the ordinance. It really streamlines that process.

Mayor Alvey asked do you have more to add? **Mr. Bach** said no. I believe the comments by Ken are accurate and it just allows us a little bit more flexibility in how we move forward with any violations at the local level.

Mayor Alvey asked do any members of the Commission have any questions or comments.

Commissioner Burroughs asked do we have a level of fines available. Do we know what the fine would be? **Mr. Moore** said, Commissioner, it is a Class C Misdemeanor which has a maximum fine of \$500 per violation.

Action: **ORDINANCE NO. Doug Bach, County Administrator, said this is a request that as we move into this time we've already found to have a little bit more flexibility based on the timing of an action that may come about. As we go forward this gives me the flexibility to be able to appoint a deputy coroner or the coroner to appoint a deputy in the event we need it. We thought it would behoove us to bring this forward at this time and request for that approval.

Mayor Alvey said I now us call us back to order as the Wyandotte County Board of Health.

Item No. 1 – 2070...UPDATE: COVID-19

Synopsis: COVID-19 update, submitted by Terrie Garrison, Interim Director of Public Health.

Terrie Garrison, Interim Director of Public Health, said I wanted to give an update. So far at this point we do have nine lab confirmed positive cases of the COVID-19 in our county. You can find current case counts on our website which is wycokck.org/covin-19. We are investigating all of the contacts. We're doing contact investigation on all nine of those folks that have tested positive and trying to find out where they have been, doing tracing of where they've been, who they have been in contact with and if those folks have had any symptoms and making sure they have in fact self-quarantine, to see if they have developed symptoms or need to be tested; those kind of things.

We are also setting up a process for testing. We have testing—a safety net provider at Southwest Boulevard. Southwest Boulevard has agreed to do drive-thru testing for the other safety net providers; however, you do have to go through a safety net provider to get triaged and make sure they've gone through the triage tree before they can approve for you to be tested. That started today I believe, and I don't know how many they actually had today. Have we heard Dr. Greiner?

Dr. Allen Greiner, Local Health Officer, said there were four tests administered today. Most of those tests will be going to private laboratories, either Quest or LabCorp, referenced labs in the area. We're trying to work closely with that testing site to help with protocol development, help with follow-up. They have volunteered some of their staff to do follow-up, but we will also be doing contact investigation and tracing with those individuals and any contacts they may have.

I will also note we've increased the size of our contact investigation activities. We've got an operation center that we expanded today with some training we delivered to new individuals. We hope to expand that more with some of the physicians who are trainees from the University of Kansas Medical Center as well as possibly volunteers from Heart to Heart International who has offered some of their volunteers that have done infectious disease work internationally in previous disaster areas. We're pretty happy about that.

Johnson County has decided not to continue contact tracing on their patients and contacts because they've been designated as having community spread which means essentially that

they've had positive cases where they could not determine where that particular positive case could have contracted the disease.

We've so far been moving forward with the idea that we may be able to sustain our contact tracing and investigation activity and, hopefully, we can continue it indefinitely because we think it will allow us to control spread better. As we do this we ask a lot of people to go into voluntary 14-day quarantine. If they're A systematic but they close contact with a positive case or with a case that we call presumptive positive. We're now moving into the phase where we're probably also going to have to designate individuals and have community members self-designate themselves as presumptively positive. The reason for that is there is a shortage of testing kits and testing resources in the region. In fact, we're getting a lot of pressure from one particular local hospital that feels like community testing is causing a burden on their ability to test and on their ability to have enough personal protective equipment in the hospital setting. We're still trying to negotiate out all the features of that, but we feel like having at least some community testing and having as much contact investigation as we can have will help us especially given the fact, as we all know, we have a community that has a number of vulnerable segments. We want to do everything we can to try to limit impact there.

Ms. Garrison said we're setting up a self-report application so that folks can self-report their symptoms and also the severity of their symptoms that it's their self-report of and then we can get back with them. We can come back around behind them and follow-up with them and do kind of a presumptive positive for the folks that actually give us that information and it appears that they potentially would be positive. That can help us with hotspotting different areas within our community to know kind of where we might be actually seeing some pockets of infection though we don't actually have the test to prove that.

Some things that are going well, we've had great help and collaboration with all of the UG Departments from everywhere from communications and IT. Just every department within the UG has been great. We've also have some assistance with external partners; all of our safety net providers, Wyandotte Health Foundation is coming onboard to help with some funding sources for our safety net. We have Matt May is with our Emergency Department and he has been taking the orders for all of our personal protective equipment that we need to be ordering. We've also

had other people. We had our epidemiologist who used to work with us. She has reached out said I can volunteer to help do some of this, so it's been great.

Some of the challenges is our supplies, making sure of our supplies, both not only internally at the Health Department, but most importantly, externally at the hospitals as well as at the safety net providers and other healthcare providers that are seeing these folks making sure that they have sufficient supplies to protect the healthcare workers who we need obviously to be healthy as well our EMS folks and our Police Officers. We need to make sure they're well supplied and that's been a challenge, as well as you heard Dr. Greiner say, just testing supplies and making sure that testing supplies are available so we can continue to do those as needed.

Again, the same message, what we need to say is social distancing each other, making sure you stay home if you are sick. Please do not go out if you're running a fever, if you have a cough, if you have signs of COVID unless you're going to your healthcare provider. We need you to wash your hands constantly. Soap and water does an amazing thing. If that's not available to you, use your hand sanitizer and just protect your families, protect the community as a whole, and protect your neighbors and lookout for them as well. Try to keep that social distancing and handshaking—don't do handshaking and keep the 6 foot for less than 10 minutes kind of things. We're working with the Unified Government as well as other areas for keeping those things.

Dr. Greiner said folks may have seen this but there is a whole lot of information at wycokck.org/coronavirus. We hope to have the self-report symptom page embedded within there by tomorrow morning. We're working kinks out with that now. We're following a lead on a heavily hit county in Colorado on that initiative and we'll see how that goes. We'll try to do contact investigation with all those folks as well, but the website is really great. The Health Department Public Information Officer Janelle Friesen has done a wonderful job with that work as well as the communication team with the UG. I think we're going to keep working on that and if there is feedback, I think we would like to have it so we can keep making that better. I think at times when we throw this science out and it's all happening so fast, we're forgetting about literacy issues and numerous issues and issues that our population might have in terms of digesting that info. We would love feedback on that as we go.

Mayor Alvey said, Commission, before we take questions, I think maybe we can anticipate some of those. Momentarily I'm going to have Administrator Bach give a description of the operations side of this from the Unified Government. I just want to let you know, and you probably saw it through the Facebook Live, but as soon as this hit we began to meet as a collaborative of community stakeholders which really is led by our public health professionals, from the public Health Department. That daily meeting conference call includes the hospitals, University of Kansas Health System, Providence Medical Center. It includes our Social Service Agencies, it includes Wyandotte Behavioral Health, Donnelly College, Kansas City Kansas Community College, Mayor McTaggart of Edwardsville and his staff, Mayor Harrington of Bonner Springs and his staff and in all these efforts we are trying to make sure that we are gathering the right information, getting the right answers. We've really tried to take a longer view of this. We're really trying to look at the experience that has been had by other nations; Italy, South Korea, China; what did they do. What was their timeframe. We're looking at what is happening in other parts of the nation obviously. We're trying to stay out in front of this and ask ourselves if in two weeks we think we're going to be at this place in terms of public policy or ordinances, why would we not move that place now.

The whole point in all this has been to flatten the curve. The constant refrain across the country and across the world is that you need to flatten—you're going to have exposures, you're going to have people infected, that has already happened, it's going to continue. We want to avoid a spike that would overload our healthcare system. The recent decision by us and by Johnson County, Jackson County and Kansas City, Missouri to close restaurants and bars was really an attempt to get out in front of that because that is what is happening elsewhere.

All things are being considered. All options are on the table practically every day and at the same time we're trying to anticipate additional problems. Let's say for instance, what is this going to mean for our mental healthcare providers and what kind of resources do they need and what kind of information do we need to get back from them. It's a very good discussion and it's a great collaboration. I think it's been very effective and we're going to continue on.

Having said that, I'm now going to pass it over to Mr. Bach.

Mr. Bach said as the Mayor stated, as soon as we went into this situation we started also having meetings with people that are out in the field doing responses to everyone. First and foremost,

what do we need to do to protect the people of this community. Also, with that, we also wanted to make sure we were putting all the measures in place to protect the workforce that we have out there. The many first responders that we have that are going out on a daily basis through our Police, Fire and Sheriff Departments as well as our health officials that are out there meeting with people every day, interacting with them, and taking the steps.

We have been working with the State of Kansas and others to try to get additional supplies in. There's still a big task to go through in trying to do that because we know we are limited in how long we can go, but we will continue to fight and do our best to get that in place.

This week we began closing many different offices within the government operations, in our court systems, reacted quickly with those to make some short-term closing and now they have done so to take it long-term. Effective Monday we will effectively close our operations to the public and that includes both in our Motor Vehicle area for those tags so there will be some leniency that's out there for someone, if you bought a new car, but a lot of stuff is still available online so you can do your work that way for all renewals and such or through the mail.

Court systems have suspended through April 17th or through the 20th. That's kind of the Friday-Monday between what we're doing at the Municipal Court level and the District Court level. The only exception for the District Courts is if they will have some cases that will come forward, those will be designated by the Judge and others will be notified when they need to come to that. Otherwise, individuals will not be allowed to come into City Hall, the Courthouse, Neighborhood Resource Center or our Annex operations until further notice.

We will continue to have some public meetings. When we do have those, we will announce that, and we will open our doors approximately 15-30 minutes before those meetings start until we come up with other arrangements for the public to participate in those meetings.

Other exceptions to our openings will be with our Police Headquarters, South Patrol and Midtown Patrol will still be available for people to walk in and provide reports. We do have glassed-in areas in those areas for security purposes and Transit Operations will continue to operate throughout the metro at this time. We will continue to work our bus service in coordination with what is going on with the Metro where people are still in need of this service.

In saying that, I would continue, and I encourage people to use our website as was stated earlier by the Health Department, wycokck.org. You can go in and all the postings that are out there regarding COVID-19, the daily updates, they're on that site for everyone to access so it's

real important for everyone to continue to look at that and reference that site for material. That's all I have, but I would answer any questions anyone may have.

Mayor Alvey said I just want to reiterate, I think it's very important as we get calls from constituents asking questions or texts, that we first of all refer them to the website and if they don't get the answer there, that's important for us to know that may be another question that we need to answer and get out there. Always move people to the website and have them try to get that information and continue to use that because we are trying to get as much information on that website as possible.

I will also say that in addition to this collaborative group, stakeholders from across the county, we're also trying to bring into the loop as we're getting more and more questions from the business community. So, we will be beginning teleconference calls with the Kansas City Kansas Chamber of Commerce, the Bonner Springs/Edwardsville Chamber of Commerce, Wyandotte County Economic Development, and other business groups so that we first of all can hear their concerns, carry their needs forward. We're going to do that on a regular basis. It may not be daily, but it will be as needed as much as necessary.

Also, I want to appreciate—give a shout out to Commissioner Johnson who is reaching out and sent to us great contacts throughout the city for the Pastors. We're going to be conducting some regular teleconference calls with the Pastors who have special ways of communicating with their congregants. We appreciate their cooperation, the Pastors cooperation in keeping crowds below 10 or numbers below 10. That's very important. As we all know, we're simply trying to flatten the curve and if we can limit the contact everywhere and anywhere, it just gets us that much further along.

Having said all that, I know you have a lot of questions and we'll take questions.

Commissioner Markley said I just want to say to staff in particular and to you Mayor, thank you for your leadership this past week. Obviously, this isn't a situation where every commissioner can be involved in every decision. Things are moving much too quickly for that, so I appreciate that you guys have been in the trenches taking care of these issues while we have literally in most cases been sitting at home. Thanks for your leadership.

Commissioner Bynum said I do want to echo what Commissioner Markley just said and I really appreciate your leadership and the leadership of Mr. Bach. I want to extend that out to our Public Safety folks and every department. It has been amazing to watch the cooperation and teamwork that has transpired. The only other thing I really want to add is this community has shown us once again how resilient we are. I'm on social media watching neighborhoods take care of each other, small businesses modified their business practices, and the community stepping up to support them and on down the line. Just every segment of our lives have been upended and yet we're all stepping forward to support one another and it has been really incredible to watch. Actually, my shout out is to all of Wyandotte County. Thank you very much.

Commissioner Ramirez said echoing everything Commissioner Bynum and Commissioner Markley have said, but all the actions that our administration and staff have taken says volumes to the dedication they have to this community. I thank you, my district and the constituents in my district thank you.

Commissioner McKiernan said in watching the YouTube presentation, there was one person who did comment that I called the Health Department to see where testing was done, and they gave me another number to call. I thought it might be good for us to reiterate one more time our standard procedure that we don't do the testing and what steps we take to redirect people who would call us.

Ms. Garrison said yes, Commissioner McKiernan, we do not do testing at the Health Department. We have several safety net providers within our community including three federally qualified health centers and so we turn to them for the clinical arm of the public health system and ask them for that assistance. That's where we would have them go is to one of the safety net if they do not have their own private care provider. If they have their own PCP, then we would want them to go there. If they don't, this is the opportunity for them to learn of our great safety net folks that work with our population.

Commissioner McKiernan said thank you Terrie. Thank you so much. I just wanted to make sure the people clearing understand that we, as the Unified Government, don't do the testing and that we then would refer to someone else to carry that out.

Ms. Garrison said I'm being reminded by our PIO that they need to call first before—don't just show up at their door. They need to call first because if they are showing symptoms, we want to make sure that the provider is prepared for them and can make sure everybody in the clinic is safe.

Commissioner Johnson said first of all Mayor and County Administrator, you're doing a great job of getting the information out and I appreciate your diligence in getting the information out and making sure it is out there. I also want to appreciate my fellow Commissioner Townsend for making sure that UGTV is being updated more frequently as well with all of the information that we have.

It may have already been stated by Administrator Bach, but if you have already spoken to this, maybe you can reiterate whether we're getting information out multiple languages so that our diverse population we can speak to all of those persons that are representing in our community.

Mr. Bach said, yes Commissioner, we are sending information out in Spanish. I believe, I would have to look to my PIOs, if we're doing anything else.

Janell Friesen, PIO for the Health Department, said we are working with some of our staff who are multilingual as well as some of our partners and services that can provide those translations to get additional materials. Things like print materials, things on the web, and videos that are in different languages.

Mr. Bach said we are currently out in English and Spanish and then working on additional languages as we can.

Mayor Alvey said, Commissioner Johnson, I will add that specifically I have been able to reach out and make contact with Spanish radio stations. There are three Spanish radio stations in the market that are religious faith-based, so we've reached out to them. We've also reached out to the largest Spanish radio station and are providing them with information. I've also reached out to the Mon community and tried to work through their network to make sure that any questions they may have, we're able to get that information to them.

Ms. Garrison said we've also been working with the refugee resettlement program at Catholic Charities as well.

Commissioner Townsend said it's already been stated, but it's certainly worth echoing again, how we appreciate the guidance and leadership shown by Mayor Alvey, Administrator Bach, our Health Department officials, and all the employees of the Unified Government and our first responders. One of the commissioners has already clarified I think that if someone believes they're exhibiting symptoms, that their first call should be, I believe, to their primary care physician. Is that correct? **Ms. Garrison** said yes, that is correct.

Commissioner Townsend said I would like to ask Administrator Bach again to talk about the changes and delays in the court system and how individuals will know if their scheduled hearings have been postponed or if they need to come in. I wasn't really clear on that one. Thank you again for all you all are doing.

Mr. Bach said on the District Court level that is one where those hearings—I mean the jury trials have all been pushed back indefinitely until they are able to come back in and set that up. Individuals that have hearings if they need to come before a Judge, that's communication with their lawyer and the individuals specifically regarding that.

For Municipal Court, our announcement is out there. I know we tried to put a large mailing—and Ken you may have a better understanding of what we did, we tried to put some communication to people that did have court dates in place. However, most of it is through the notice notification that we are just not open during this time period and they will be extended. Ken, do you have anything to add to that?

Ken Moore, Chief Legal Counsel, said my understanding is that Municipal Court has reached out to people that have current settings now and advised them that everything will be set at some date I believe past May 3rd. The Prosecutors Office has reached out to the victims of offenses and witnesses were also notified.

Mr. Bach said we're doing what we can to reach out to those that we did have preset dates with and communicate with them about to be rescheduled. We're not setting those dates until we—I don't believe we're setting those dates until we know when we're able to go back in session.

Commissioner Burroughs asked do we have as commissioners a point of contact that we can call in and ask questions. I know you said refer everybody to the website, but I know there will be

some people that won't have access to social media. Is there somebody we can specifically have as a point person to call in with questions we might have or get to help guide us? **Mr. Bach** said I would ask that you contact Assistant Administrator Emerick Cross and he will either answer your question or get the appropriate person to answer your questions. **Commissioner Burroughs** said I appreciate that. I know these are very challenging uncharted times. I think the leadership has been demonstrated by those that are working collectively to ensure the safety of our community as first and foremost and that we're prepared as we can be under the circumstances. I commend you all. It is quite challenging. We've seen it on the State side. We are here as partners. I commend you all, so thank you so very much for the time you've put into this and for the update.

Mayor Alvey said I would also again thank all the commissioners for all the work you're doing and your leadership in the community. I think especially at this time it's the communication piece and is extremely important. One of the reasons why we wanted to convene the collaborative of anchor institutions and service providers across the county on a daily basis was simply to drive out inaccurate information or to fill a vacuum of a lack of information. That the more stakeholders who were engaged in the conversation at all levels, the better that information is disseminated among people. These are people that are respected, who are leaders in their own areas and their voice carry's a lot of weight and the fact that they have that information and are a part of the discussion moving forward, I think has been very helpful. That's why we really want to continue to push information out to the Commission. We thank you.

If you go on social media, if you see something that really needs to be challenged, please challenge it. I think it's dangerous for us to leave voices out there that are, frankly, sometimes being irresponsible and we have to challenge that. This is not a time for people to use this crisis somehow as a way to make some kind of petty—win some kind of petty battle. It's not what this is about and no one in that collaborative feels that way and acts that way. Unfortunately, as we know on social media, people believe they can say anything they want and make any kind of comment without good information. This is not the time for that kind of activity. Thank you for your leadership in taking on some of that lack of information and, frankly, some purposely bad communication.

Just as an example, I got a text from someone wanting to know if the liquor stores in Wyandotte County are closed and I could say no. Did you hear any alarms go off because alarms

would have gone off if that happened, but again, that kind of information gets out there and spreads and we have to challenge it but thank you.

Item No. 2 – 2070...RESOLUTION: EMERGENCY PUBLIC HEALTH ORDERS

Synopsis: A resolution ratifying and supporting the emergency public health orders issued by Dr. Allen Greiner in his role as Local Health Officer on March 16, 2020, and on March 17, 2020, submitted by Doug Bach, County Administrator.

Mayor Alvey asked do any members of the Commission have any questions or comments.

Action: **RESOLUTION NO.
