A RESOLUTION

**RECOGNIZING THE GROWING PROBLEM OF
ANTISEMITISM IN THE UNITED STATES AND CALLING
FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL
HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE ALLIANCE WORKING
DEFINITION OF ANTISEMITISM AS AN IMPORTANT
TOOL TO ADDRESS THE PROBLEM**

WHEREAS, antisemitism, including harassment based on actual or perceived Jewish origin, ancestry, ethnicity, identity, affiliation or faith, remains a persistent and disturbing problem in American society; and

WHEREAS, the Jewish community continues to be targeted in the United States and is consistently the most likely of all religious groups to be victimized by incidents of hate; and

WHEREAS, incidents motivated by antisemitism are increasing at an alarming rate; and

WHEREAS, the deadliest attack to date against the American Jewish community took place on October 27, 2018, at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where this senseless act of violence took the lives of 11 members of the Tree of Life, New Light and Dor Hadash congregations; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Jewish community has experienced firsthand the deadly result of antisemitism when, on April 13, 2014, three people lost their lives due to antisemitic attacks at the Jewish Community Center of Greater Kansas City and the Village Shalom, both located in Overland Park, Kansas; and

WHEREAS, State officials and institutions have a responsibility to protect citizens from acts of hate and bigotry, including antisemitism, and must adopt the tools to do so; and

WHEREAS, valid monitoring, informed analysis, investigation and effective policy making benefit from accurate and uniform definitions; and

WHEREAS, in May 2016, the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA), by a consensus vote of its member states, adopted a Working Definition of Antisemitism; and

WHEREAS, the IHRA's Working Definition of Antisemitism includes eleven examples of contemporary antisemitism that capture some of the many ways antisemitism manifests itself, whether in public life, media, schools, the workplace, or the religious sphere; and

WHEREAS, the IHRA's Working Definition of Antisemitism has become the internationally recognized and authoritative definition used by governments, international organizations, and educational institutions; and

WHEREAS, the IHRA's Working Definition of Antisemitism is utilized by numerous government and law enforcement agencies, including the United States Department of State and the United States Department of Education, in monitoring, training and education, and has been adopted through legislative or executive action in an increasing number of U.S. states; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE UNIFIED GOVERNMENT OF WYANDOTTE COUNTY/KANSAS CITY, KANSAS:

Section 1. The Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas, adopts the non-legally binding International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance Working Definition of Antisemitism, including the 11 contemporary examples; and

Section 2. The Governing Body of the Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas, will ensure that the Working Definition of Antisemitism is utilized as an educational resource and primary reference guiding supplemental curricula and training programs, making related materials available to guide the various local agencies regularly contending with and responsible for addressing antisemitism and other forms of discrimination, which include all Unified Government departments; and

Section 3. Nothing in this resolution shall be construed to diminish or infringe upon any right protected under the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution of the State of Kansas; and

Item Description:

The Unified Government of Wyandotte County Public Health Department is recommending the implementation and development of a Tobacco Retail Licensing Program (TRL) in Wyandotte County, Kansas. A TRL ordinance provides municipal regulation over tobacco sales towards youth populations by enforcing already existing laws. In the United States, the average age for when people first try a cigarette is 14.5 years and the average age when people become a daily smoker is 17.7 years of age. The problem of youth tobacco use can be largely attributed to retailers selling to underage customers. One study found up to 74% of retailers were selling to underage customers; several other studies have found between 30% and 40% of retailers violating age restrictions. TRLs have been shown to drastically reduce the number of retailers selling to underage customers. In the State of Kansas, the municipalities of Wichita, Newton, and Lawrence have already implemented a local TRL.

The ordinance proposes a Tobacco Retail License cost of \$1,000 per year for all Wyandotte County tobacco retailers. Due to Wyandotte County having over 150 tobacco retailers, this amount will generate \$150,000 or more in revenue. This revenue will fully pay for the program, funding a position within the UGPHD that will conduct semi-annual license checks and educational materials. As a result, no funding is being requested from the UG's annual budget.

BACKGROUND:

About the Health Department's Tobacco Retail License Ordinance

The Unified Government of Wyandotte County Public Health Department (UGPHD) is recommending the implementation and development of a Tobacco Retail Licensing Program (TRL) in Wyandotte County, Kansas. A TRL ordinance provides municipal regulation over tobacco sales towards youth populations by enforcing already existing laws. In the United States, the average age for when people first try a cigarette is 14.5 years and the average age when people become a daily smoker is 17.7 years of age. The problem of youth tobacco use can be largely attributed to retailers selling to underage customers. One study found up to 74% of retailers were selling to underage customers; several other studies have found between 30% and 40% of retailers violating age restrictions. TRLs have been shown to drastically reduce the number of retailers selling to underage customers. In the state of Kansas, the municipalities of Wichita, Newton and Lawrence have already implemented a local TRL. A presentation for this TRL in Wyandotte County was requested by Commissioners Melissa Bynum and Angela Markley who proposed that this be presented to the Human Services Standing Committee.

Current partnership with American Heart Association

For nearly a year, Uzo Nwafor, Tobacco Prevention Coordinator, and Dustin Hare, Policy Analyst, have been engaging with Kari Rinker who is the State Government Relations Director with the American Heart Association. Kari has worked with other communities around the state to craft TRL ordinances and her knowledge and expertise has been critical in developing an ordinance that adheres to best practices.

BUDGET IMPACTS/FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The ordinance proposes a Tobacco Retail License cost of \$1,000 per year for all Wyandotte County tobacco retailers. Due to Wyandotte County having over 150 tobacco retailers, this amount will generate \$150,000 or more in revenue. This revenue will fully pay for the program, funding a position within the UGPHD that will conduct semi-annual license checks and educational materials. As a result, no funding is being requesting from the UG's annual budget.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS:

The tobacco retail license proposes to the following changes to the UG Municipal Code:

- Amends Section 17-8: Selling, giving or furnishing cigarettes or tobacco products to any person under 21 years of age.

Furthermore, the tobacco retail license will add the following sections to the Municipal Code:

- Sec. 17-9. License Application
- Sec. 17-10. License Fee
- Sec. 17-11. License Renewal
- Sec. 17-12. Compliance checks
- Sec. 17-13. Suspension or Revocation

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The stakeholders from the UGPHD and the American Heart Association are working in collaboration with Jeff Conway from the UG's Legal team to review the policy language prior to presenting to the Standing Committee.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

We are seeking a vote from the Standing Committee on the adoption of a local Tobacco Retail License ordinance.

Tobacco Retail License Ordinance

Overview of TRL

- Provides for municipal regulation over tobacco sales
- Create a local solution to reduce youth tobacco access to protect them from a lifelong addiction
- Holds retailers accountable for illegal tobacco sales, not low-wage clerks or youth

Community Outreach and Support



History

- Unified Government first Kansas community to pass “T21” in 2015- raising legal minimum sale age of all tobacco products from 18 to 21.
- Over 20 Kansas communities followed, preceding subsequent federal and state alignment.
- In 2020, the Commission acted upon the Health Department’s recommendation and repealed youth penalty for tobacco possession.

Youth Tobacco Use

- The average age people try smoking a cigarette is 14.5 years
- 88% of people who have ever tried a cigarette have done so by age 18
- A 2019 survey found that 25.8% of Kansas high school students had used tobacco products in the past 30 days
- The 2022 Kansas Communities that Care survey found that 14.51% of Wyandotte County youth said it would be "very easy" to get vaping products (state average was 13.97%)
- Studies in various states have shown between 23% and 40% of retailers were selling tobacco to underage customers

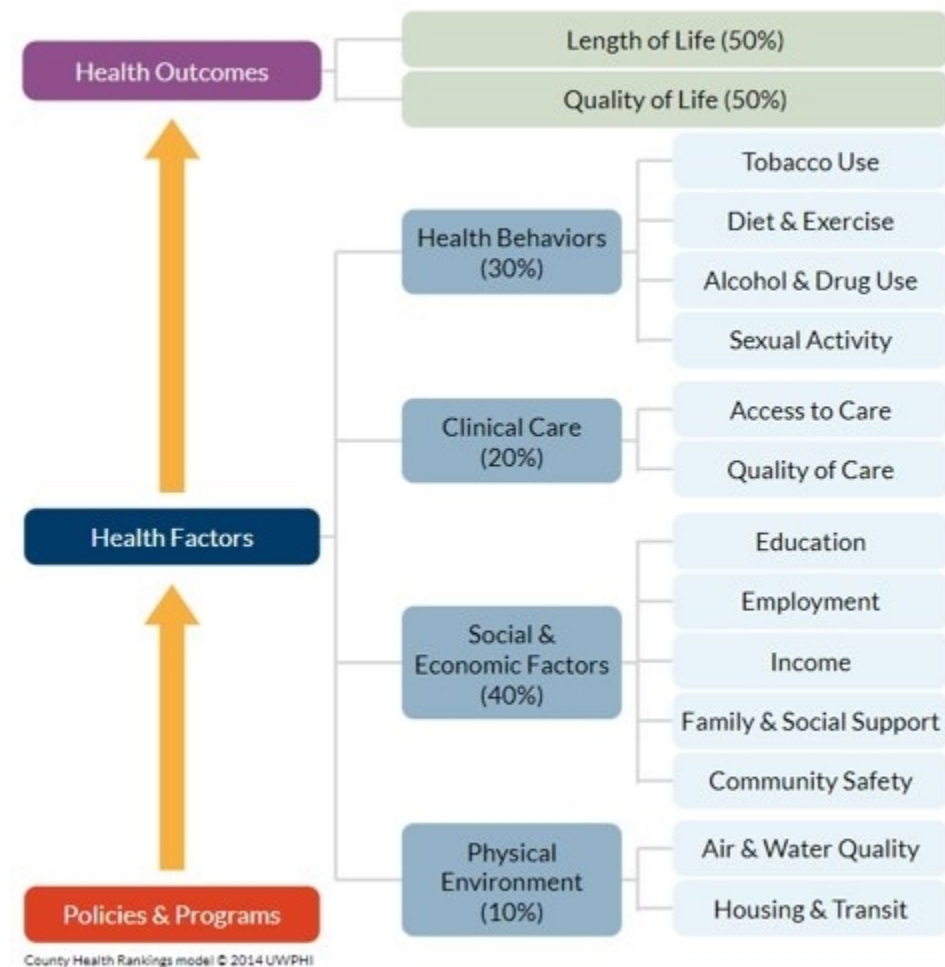

Tobacco Use & Health

Tobacco Product use can have many adverse effects on an individuals' health. Some of these effects include:

- Cancer - most commonly lung cancer
- Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)
- Tuberculosis
- Coronary heart disease
- Diabetes
- Reduced immune function



Tobacco Retail License

1. **Establish** a comprehensive list of all retailers of nicotine and tobacco products in the jurisdiction.
2. **Fund** Public Health enforcement of tobacco sales regulations at no cost to the taxpayer.
3. **Prevent** illegal sales of nicotine and tobacco products to those under 21.
4. **Provide** weight to current laws by imposing a threat of suspension for repeated violations.
5. **Reduce** productivity loss, public and private health insurance costs, related illness and death.
6. **Impact** public health through prevention, responsibility, and accountability.

Other Cities

- Wichita, Kansas passed TRL in 1994. Updated in March 2023.
- Newton, Kansas unanimously passed TRL in September 2019.
- Lawrence, Kansas unanimously passed a TRL in November 2022.
- Communities throughout the nation have adopted- too numerous to track. Retailers are accustomed to varying licensing and regulations and consider it the cost of doing business.

TRL Benefits

- Wichita, KS established a TRL in 1994.
- Higher compliance rate than many other communities with TRL.
- Sedgwick County Smoking rate 18.5% vs Wyandotte 23.2%
- Updated March 2023 – Via unanimous vote, the City Council repealed youth penalty and strengthened retailer penalties for illegal sales to youth.

Policy Recommendations

- Amend section 17-8 - Selling, giving or furnishing cigarettes or tobacco products to any person under 21 years of age.
- Establish a municipal tobacco retail license program housed within and enforced by UGPHD.
- Establish a process to apply for and renew licenses.
- Establish an annual retail license fee, paid by all tobacco retailers.
- Establish compliance check protocol.
- Amend the penalty structure.
- Clarify language.

Penalty to Retailer

- At least 1 unannounced compliance check per year of each tobacco retailer
- Compliance checks conducted by Wyandotte County Health Department
- Engage youth ages 18-20 to conduct compliance checks
- Unannounced follow-up compliance checks of all non-compliant tobacco retailers are required within 6 months of any violation of this article

Compliance Enforcement Protocol

A penalty is assessed to the business/retailer, **not the clerk, or the purchaser, user, or possessor** of a tobacco product. Tiered fines and penalties are as follows:

1. For a first violation, a fine of \$500
2. For a second violation within a 36 month period, a fine of \$750 and the tobacco retailer shall be prohibited from distributing tobacco products for 10 days
3. For a third violation within a 36 month period, a fine of \$1,000 and the tobacco retailer shall be prohibited from distributing tobacco products for 30 days
4. For a fourth and any subsequent violations within a 36 month period, a fine of \$1,250 and revocation of tobacco retail license for a period of two years

*Appeals process defined in ordinance



Annual Fee

- Recommended Annual Fee: \$1000
- Covers the administrative cost for licensing administration and enforcement
- Allows for increased tobacco programming and education by UGPHD

Clarifying Language

- Signage
- Samples
- Age verification
- Vending machines
- Mobile tobacco sales

**AN ORDINANCE AND RESOLUTION RELATING TO
THE TOBACCO RETAIL LICENSE ORDINANCE**

WHEREAS, preventing the use of tobacco products by those under 21 years of age is a goal of the Health Department;

WHEREAS, requiring retail licensing through the Health Department for tobacco sales in Wyandotte County will help curtail underage use of tobacco products;

WHEREAS, inspections by the Health Department for compliance with the retail licensing program in Wyandotte County will help curtail underage use of tobacco products;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE UNIFIED GOVERNMENT OF WYANDOTTE COUNTY/KANSAS CITY, KANSAS:

Section 1. That original Section 17-8 of the Code of the Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 17-8. - Selling, giving or furnishing tobacco products to any person under 21 years of age.

(a) The following words, terms and phrases when used in this article shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this article, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Tobacco product means any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco or that contains nicotine that is intended for human consumption or is likely to be consumed, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, or ingested, or by any other means, including but not limited to a cigarette, a cigar, hookah, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco, snuff, snus and electronic smoking device. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, "tobacco product" includes any component, part, or accessory intended or reasonably expected to be used with a tobacco product, whether or not any of these contain tobacco or nicotine, including but not limited to filters, rolling papers, blunt or hemp wraps, hookahs, and pipes, and whether or not any of these are sold separately. The term "tobacco product" does not include drugs, devices or combination products authorized for sale by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

Electronic smoking device means any device that may be used to deliver any aerosolized or vaporized substance to the person inhaling from the device, including, but not limited to, an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, vape pen, or e-hookah. Electronic smoking device includes any component, part, or accessory of the device, and also includes any substance that may be aerosolized or vaporized by such device,

whether or not the substance contains nicotine. Electronic smoking device does not include drugs, devices, or combination products authorized for sale by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

Tobacco retailer means any person, partnership, joint venture, society, club, trustee, trust, association, organization, or corporation who owns, operates, or manages any tobacco retail establishment. Tobacco retailer does not mean the non-management employees of any tobacco retail establishment.

Tobacco retail establishment means any place of business where tobacco products are available for sale to the general public. The term includes but is not limited to grocery stores, tobacco products shops, kiosks, convenience stores, gasoline service stations, bars, and restaurants.

UGPHD means the Unified Government Public Health Department.

Tobacco Retailer License means a license issued by UGPHD for the sale of tobacco products. "Tobacco retailer license" and "license" are used interchangeably in this article and shall have the same meaning.

Licensee means the holder of a valid license for the sale of tobacco products.

Person means any natural person.

Self-service display means any display from which customers may select a tobacco product without assistance from the tobacco retailer or the tobacco retailer's agent or employee and without direct person-to-person transfer between the purchaser and the tobacco retailer or tobacco retailer's agent or employee. A tobacco vending machine is a form of self-service display.

Sale includes delivery, barter, exchange, transfer or gift, or offer thereof, and each such transaction made by any person, whether as principal, proprietor, agent, servant, or employee.

Moveable Place of Business means any form of business that is operated out of a kiosk, truck, van, automobile or other type of vehicle or transportable shelter and that is not a fixed address or other permanent type of structure licensed for over-the counter sales transactions.

Licensed Product means the term that collectively refers to any tobacco product.

Arm's Length Transaction means a sale in good faith and for valuable consideration that reflects the fair market value between two informed and willing parties, neither of which is under any compulsion to participate in the transaction. A sale between relatives, related companies or partners, or a sale for which a significant purpose is avoiding the effect of the violations of this section is not an Arm's Length Transaction.

Compliance Check means the system UGPHD uses to investigate and ensure that those authorized to sell tobacco products are following and complying with the requirements of this ordinance. Compliance checks can involve the use of persons under the age of 21 who purchase or attempt to purchase tobacco products. Compliance checks may also be conducted by UGPHD, or other designated agencies for educational, research, and/or training purposes, or for investigating or enforcing federal, state, or local laws and regulations relating to tobacco products.

Delivery Sale means the sale of any tobacco product to any person for personal consumption and not for resale when the sale is conducted by any means other than an in-person, over-the counter sales transaction in a licensed retail establishment. Delivery sale includes, but is not limited to, the sale of any tobacco product when the sale is conducted by telephone, other voice transmission, mail, the internet, or app-based service. Delivery sale includes delivery by licensees or third parties by any means, including curbside pick-up.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any tobacco retailer to:

- (1) Sell tobacco products to any person under the age of 21 years; or
- (2) Sell or otherwise distribute tobacco products by or from a self-service display except in places where persons under the age of 21 are not permitted access at any time; or
- (3) Fail to verify that the purchaser is at least 21 years of age.

a. Each tobacco retailer or tobacco retailer's agent or employee shall examine the purchaser's government-issued photographic identification. No such verification is required for a person known by the tobacco retailer to be over the age of 30. That a purchaser appeared to be 30 years of age or older shall not constitute a defense to a violation of this section.

(4) Sell or offer to sell any tobacco product without first having obtained a license from UGPHD or an authorized designee of UGPHD, or without having renewed the license as required by this article. A Tobacco Retail License is required for each location in which such tobacco retailer sells or distributes tobacco products.

a. No tobacco retail establishment or person shall sell or offer to sell any tobacco product through vending machine or self-service displays in Wyandotte County without first having obtained a license from UGPHD or an authorized designee of UGPHD, or without having renewed the license as required by this article.

b. No tobacco retail establishment or person shall sell or offer to sell any tobacco product without first having posted notice of the legal sales age for the purchase of tobacco products, age verification requirements, and possible penalties for underage sales within 6 feet of each cash register or place where payment may be made in a place conspicuous to both employees and customers, and where the sign(s) are unobstructed in their entirety. The sign shall state, "THE SALE OR PROVISION OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS, INCLUDING E-CIGARETTES, TO AN INDIVIDUAL UNDER 21 YEARS OF AGE IS PROHIBITED BY LAW." The sign required shall be 5 ½ inches by 8 ½ inches and the statement required shall be printed in 36-point boldfaced type. The required signage will be provided to the licensee by UGPHD.

c. No tobacco retailer, tobacco retail establishment, or person shall gift or distribute samples of any tobacco product free of charge or at a nominal cost, regardless of the age of the person acquiring the product. The distribution of a tobacco product as a sample, free donation, gift, or at otherwise nominal cost, is prohibited and shall subject the tobacco retailer or tobacco retail establishment to the penalties prescribed under this article and those prescribed by other local, state or federal laws pertaining to samples, donation, or otherwise nominally priced tobacco products.

d. Licenses must be posted and displayed at all times in plain view of the general public or clientele of the tobacco retail establishment. Failure to display the tobacco retailer license is an accruable violation under this section.

(c) It shall be a defense to an administrative citation under subsection (b) of this section if:

- (1) The tobacco retailer sold, furnished or distributed the cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, or tobacco products to the person under 21 years of age with reasonable cause to believe the person was of legal age to purchase or receive cigarettes, electronic cigarettes or tobacco products; and
- (2) To purchase the cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, or tobacco products, the person under 21 years of age exhibited to the tobacco retailer a driver's license, Kansas non-driver's identification card or other official or apparently official document containing a photograph of the person and

purporting to establish that the person was of legal age to purchase or otherwise receive tobacco products.

(3) The tobacco retailer engages in the lawful sale, furnishing or distribution of cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, or tobacco products by mail; and

(4) The tobacco retailer sold, furnished or distributed the cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, or tobacco products to the person by mail only after the person had provided to the tobacco retailer an unsworn declaration, conforming to K.S.A. 53-601, that the person was 21 or more years of age.

~~(d) It is unlawful for any tobacco retailer to fail to post and maintain in a conspicuous place in the tobacco retail establishment the following notice: "BY LAW, CIGARETTES AND TOBACCO PRODUCTS MAY BE SOLD ONLY TO PERSONS 21 YEARS OF AGE AND OLDER."~~

~~(e)~~(d)(1) Violation of this section is a civil infraction subject to sections 2-654 through 2-662 of this Code. Any tobacco retailer found to have violated this article shall be subject to the following penalties:

a. A first violation of this section punishable by a minimum penalty of ~~\$200.00~~ *\$500.00*.

b. A second violation of this section, *occurring within a 36-months period from a first conviction*, is punishable by a minimum penalty of ~~\$500.00~~ *\$750.00*.

c. A third violation of this section, *occurring within a 36-months period from a first conviction*, is punishable by a minimum penalty of ~~\$500.00~~ *\$1,000.00*.

d. A fourth or subsequent violation of this section within a 36-month period is punishable by a minimum penalty of ~~\$1,000.00~~ *\$1,250.00* and constitutes grounds for the denial of, refusal to renew, suspension of, or revocation of any food, liquor, tobacco, or other business license issued by the city for a period of 30 days.

(2) The monies collected from violations of this section shall be used to cover the costs of tobacco retail establishment inspections, unannounced compliance checks, education and training, and administrative oversight of the tobacco enforcement program within the public health department.

(3) For purposes of this article, the person who violates this article shall be the tobacco retailer where the transaction takes place.

Section 2. That Article I of Chapter 17 of the Code of the Unified Government of Wyandotte County/Kansas City, Kansas, is amended by the addition of new sections to read as follows:

Sec. 17-9. License Application

(a) Application for a License under this article shall be made with the UGPHD, on a form provided by the UGPHD for that purpose. The application must contain the full name of the applicant, the applicant's residential and business addresses and telephone numbers, the name of the business for which the license is sought, and any additional information UGPHD deems necessary. If UGPHD or its specified designee, determines that an application is incomplete, the application will be returned to the applicant with notice of the deficiency and the requisite information necessary to make the application complete.

(b) Within 14 days of receipt of an application for a License, UGPHD shall issue the license unless:

(1) The applicant is under 21 years of age;

- (2) The application is incomplete;
 - (3) The application is determined to be fraudulent, to include a material misrepresentation, or to contain a false statement;
 - (4) UGPHD determines that the applicant is not currently in compliance with the Kansas Cigarettes and Tobacco Products Act of 1933, codified as amended at K.S.A. 79-3301 et seq.;
 - (5) The applicant has had a Tobacco Retail License revoked within 24 months, preceding the date of application;
 - (6) The applicant is in arrears with respect to the license fee or any fine imposed for violation of this ordinance; or
 - (7) The business for which the tobacco retailer license is requested is a moveable place of business. Only fixed-location retail establishments are eligible to be licensed.
- (c) If the application is determined to be deficient because it is incomplete, including the failure to pay the license fee or failure to sign the document provided by UGPHD, UGPHD shall give notice to the applicant 14 days therefrom within which to provide a completed application.
 - (d) If the application is denied, or the applicant fails to complete the application within the 14-day period, then UGPHD shall deny the application by giving Notice of Denial to the applicant.
 - (e) If a license is mistakenly issued or renewed to an applicant, UGPHD or its designee may revoke the license upon the discovery that the applicant was ineligible for the license under this ordinance. UGPHD or its designee will provide the tobacco retailer license holder with notice of the revocation, along with information on the right to appeal.
 - (f) If a tobacco retail license is suspended or revoked, whether due to applicant or licensee ineligibility, or determination of a violation under this ordinance, or any other federal, state, or local law or regulation, the license fee is forfeited to UGPHD and shall not be refunded to the applicant or licensee.
 - (g) Licenses issued under this article are non-transferable.
 - (h) The license term is one calendar year, beginning on January 1. During the first year of the tobacco retail license program after enactment or if a business is newly established within the city after January 1 of any year, the amount for the license fee is determined by dividing the annual license fee by four and multiplying the figure so obtained by the number of quarters or fractions of quarters remaining until the next January 1.
 - (i) Licenses issued under this article shall be valid until 11:59 p.m. on December 31 of the year in which the License is issued.

Sec. 17-10. License Fee

- (a) To commence the Tobacco Retailer License program, Tobacco Retailer License applications shall be sent to tobacco retailers and tobacco retail establishments by UGPHD on or about November 1, 2024. The license fee of \$600.00 shall be due with the application before January 1, 2025. On and after January 1, 2025, the license fee for each Tobacco Retail License required by this article shall be \$600.00 per year and shall be due at the time of application.
- (b) The license fee shall not be refunded upon suspension or revocation of a Tobacco Retail License.
- (c) The fees stated in this section shall be used to cover the administrative costs for administering licenses, providing education and training, and making retail inspections, and unannounced

compliance checks as authorized by law. The County Administrator, pursuant to 2-291, shall from time to time review the costs of the license fees and adjust the license fees to ensure that the program established by this article remains revenue neutral.

Sec. 17-11. License Renewal

- (a) On or about November 1 of each year, UGPHD will mail to each Tobacco Retail Licensee a renewal notice and a renewal application form.
- (b) To renew a license under this article, the Licensee must, before January 1 of the succeeding year: (1) remit to UGPHD the license fee; (2) complete the renewal application form; (3) sign the statement that the Licensee has read this article and has provided training to all of its employees, if any, who engage in the distribution of tobacco products; and (4) return the completed renewal application form and all requested information to UGPHD.
- (c) A license issued under this article shall not be renewed if the Licensee has any outstanding fines issued under this Article, if the renewal form is incomplete, or if UGPHD determines that the Licensee is no longer in compliance with the Kansas Cigarettes and Tobacco Products Act of 1933, codified as amended at K.S.A. 79-3301 et seq..

Sec. 17-12. Compliance checks

- (a) A tobacco retailer shall be subject to at least one unannounced compliance check per year. UGPHD or its authorized designee shall conduct compliance checks for the purposes of evaluating compliance with this article, by engaging persons that are 18 years old through 20 years old to enter the tobacco retail establishment to attempt to purchase tobacco products. Unannounced follow-up compliance checks of all non-compliant tobacco retailers shall occur within six months of any violation of this article.

Sec. 17-13. Suspension or Revocation

- (a) The UGPHD may deny, suspend, revoke or refuse to renew a license for any tobacco retailer pursuant to this section. Such denial, suspension or revocation order shall be mailed to the applicant or the licensee by registered or certified mail at the address shown on the application. In lieu of such mailing, the health director or the director's representative may personally serve such order. The order shall set forth the reasons for the action taken. Such service must be made within ten calendar days after the day the order is signed. Unless appealed, the order shall become final and effective 15 days from the date of its service.
- (b) UGPHD shall deny, suspend, revoke or refuse to renew a license for a period not less than 10 days upon second violation of provisions of this article or any federal or state laws related to the distribution or use of tobacco products.
- (c) UGPHD shall deny, suspend, revoke or refuse to renew a license for a period not less than 30 days upon third violation of provisions of this article or any federal or state laws related to the distribution or use of tobacco products.
- (d) UGPHD shall deny, suspend, revoke or refuse to renew a license for a period not less than 2 years upon fourth violation of provisions of this article or any federal or state laws related to the distribution or use of tobacco products.
- (e) Any person, tobacco retailer, or tobacco retail establishment found to be selling without a valid tobacco retail license shall be subject to a civil infraction punishable by a minimum penalty of \$500.00 fine upon first violation. If the same person, tobacco retailer, or tobacco retail establishment is found to be selling without a valid tobacco retail license a second time within 12 months of the first violation, such individual, tobacco retailer, or tobacco retail establishment

shall be issued a No Sales Order for Tobacco Products and shall be ineligible to receive a tobacco retailer license for a period of two (2) years.

- (f) Court prosecution or conviction of a violation is not necessary to prove an occurrence that triggers an administrative penalty or suspension or revocation under this section. A journal entry of conviction shall serve as prima facie evidence of an occurrence.
- (g) In addition to any other penalty, a person, tobacco retailer or tobacco retail establishment that violates any provision of this article or any local, state or federal law relating to tobacco product sales is subject to the penalties prescribed in this section, including civil penalties and the prohibition from distributing tobacco products.

Sec. 17-14. Appeals

- (a) Any applicant or licensee who is aggrieved by such order of suspension or revocation may, within 15 days after the date of service, request a hearing on the order. Such request shall be sent to the health director by registered or certified mail and shall specify why the denial, suspension or revocation is unjust, unreasonable or illegal. Upon receipt of such request, the health director shall fix a date for a hearing which shall not be less than ten days or more than 30 days after the date of receipt of the request. Any appeal shall stay the administrative penalty, suspension or revocation of the license until the matter is heard by the director.
- (b) Hearings will be conducted by a hearing officer. On the basis of the evidence produced at the hearing, the hearing officer shall make findings of fact and conclusions. The health director shall then make an order pursuant to the findings and conclusions and cause the order to be served on the applicant or licensee. The order of the director shall be final.
- (c) In any hearing before the Director pursuant to this section, a certified copy of conviction from any local or state court is prima facie evidence of a violation.
- (d) Any notice, order or instrument issued by or with the authority of the health director or the hearing officer may be made by mailing a copy by registered or certified mail directly to the person affected at such person's last known post office address as shown by the records of the public health department.
- (e) An appeal may be taken from any final order or final determination of the director to the district court in Wyandotte County, Kansas. Notice of appeal from any such final order or determination shall be served on the health director. Service of a notice of appeal shall not operate as a stay of the public health department's order.

Section 3. That said original Section 17-8 be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 4. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any persons or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or application of the Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 5. This resolution and ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and a summary published in the official Unified Government newspaper.

**A RESOLUTION FOR THE APPROVAL OF LOCAL SET ASIDE ARPA FUNDS TO BE

WHEREAS, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) was signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021, (Public Law 117-2), and was codified at 42 U.S.C. § 802 *et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, ARPA established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, which were together intended to provide support to State, local, and Tribal governments in responding to the impact of COVID-19 and in their efforts to contain COVID-19 on their communities, residents, and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Recovery Funds are intended to build on and expand the support provided to these governments over the last year, including through the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF), which was established by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Pub. L. No. 116-136, 134 Stat. 281 (2020); and

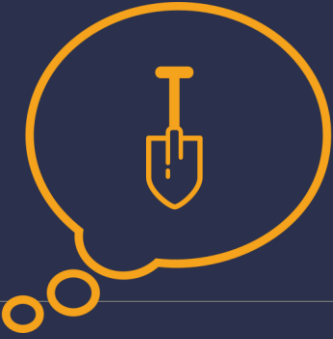

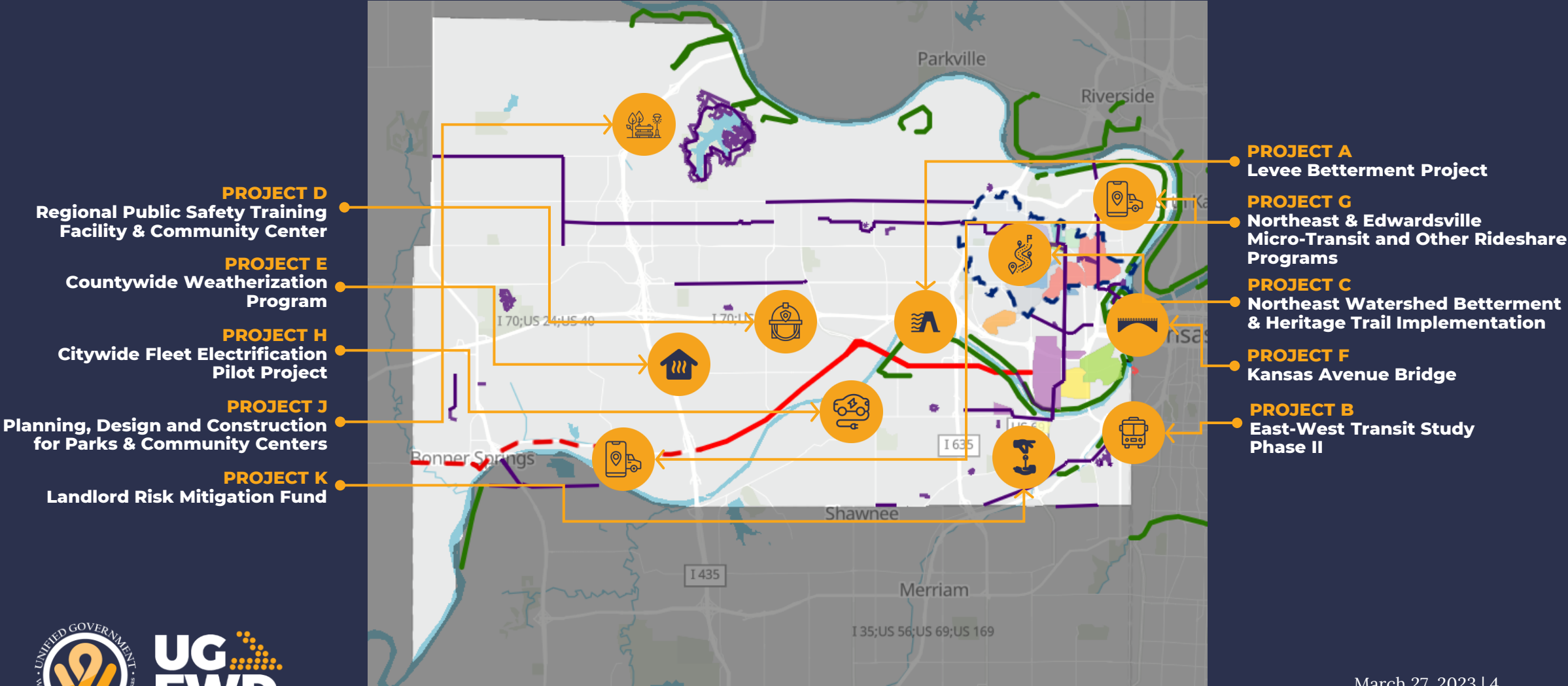

Beginning in 2022, the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority (KCATA) and project partners, including the UG, evaluated an east-west, high-capacity transit connection between the University of Kansas Health System and Rock Island Corridor/Truman Sports Complex (Kauffman Stadium and Arrowhead Stadium). Results of this initial project phase have determined a streetcar route that will end at the KU Medical Center in Rosedale. Project partners, which include RideKC Streetcar and Kansas City, Missouri, are pursuing funding through the 2023 RAISE grant, which will allow for advanced planning and preliminary engineering of the selected streetcar route. The East-West transit corridor would be the first bi-state fixed route line in over 100 years and opens the door for future streetcar expansion into KCK and Wyandotte County.

Northeast KCK requires many infrastructure updates and implementation which the commission has supported through the approvals of WIFIA/SRF/ARPA funded programs and partnering with MARC to fund much needed studies. Many ongoing projects, such as Jersey Creek Naturalization, are partially funded but require additional grants to be completed. WHEREAS, ARPA established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, which were together intended to provide support to State, local, and Tribal governments in responding to the impact of COVID-19 and in their efforts to contain COVID-19 on their communities, residents, and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Recovery Funds are intended to build on and expand the support provided to these governments over the last year, including through the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF), which was established by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Pub. WHEREAS, Ordinance O-115-21 and Resolution R-58-21 approved that of the Kansas City, Kansas total allocation, Eighteen Million Seven Hundred Eighty Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$18,780,470) will be used to replace revenue lost due to COVID-19 during 2020, and an estimated Twelve Million Three Hundred Four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-Four Dollars (\$12,304,774) will be used to replace revenue lost due to COVID-19 during 2021, for a total revenue replacement allocation over the two year period of Thirty One Million Eighty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Forty-Four Dollars (\$31,085,244); and

WHEREAS, Ordinance O-115-21 and Resolution R-58-21 approved that of the Wyandotte County, Kansas total allocation, Six Million Six Hundred Fifty Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$6,650,880) will be used to replace revenue lost due to COVID-19 during 2020, and an estimated Four Million Three Hundred Seventy Thousand Ninety-Five Dollars (\$4,370,095) will be used to replace revenue lost due to COVID-19 during 2021, for a total revenue

replacement allocation over the two year period of Eleven Million Twenty Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$11,020,975); and

WHEREAS, of the amount received on behalf of Kansas City, Kansas, that was used to replace revenue lost due to COVID-19, Three Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,500,000) was set aside specifically for grant matching funds; and

WHEREAS, the Unified Government of Wyandotte County, Kansas City, Kansas has been awarded a \$1 million grant from the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority's (KCATA) Regional Surface Transportation Program (STP) to fund transit enhancements along the State Avenue 101 line including bus stops and shelter, and including transit amenities such as signage, benches, trash cans, and sidewalk connections; and

WHEREAS, the receipt of grant funds through STP is contingent on the Unified Government providing matching funds in the amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000).

BACKGROUND:

- The Wyandotte County Health Department started the Fetal Infant Mortality Review Board in 2012 when we received grant funds from three organizations: Kansas Health Foundation, Kansas Action for Children and United Methodist Health Ministry Fund.
- The grant funds ended in 2018 and this work was funded under the Title V Maternal Child Health (MCH) block grant and General Funds.
- The Health Department employs three supporting positions for FIMR. This includes Maternal Interviewer/Case Review Team (CRT) Coordinator, Part-time Chart Abstractor/RN and a full-time FIMR Community Action Team (CAT) Program Coordinator.
- The Health Department is requesting \$72,000 to build the capacity of this inter-agency team. Money will be used to increase the capacity of the FIMR CAT and make the community aware of the FIMR CAT.

The Wyandotte County Health Department wishes to apply for the grant “2023-2024 grants to address: Building Capacity for Local, State, and Tribal Child Death Review and Fetal-Infant Mortality Review Teams” through the National Center of Fatality Review and Prevention. With all FIMR positions filled, and with efforts shifting from COVID-19 back to departmental work, there is ample time and dedication to invigorate the since paused FIMR efforts. Upon the addition of the new CAT coordinator, August 3th, 2023, the FIMR team evaluated where the CRT and the CAT are lacking. The teams identified that community participation, recognition, and implementation where the three largest areas of improvement could be remedied by outreach marketing, community ground initiatives, and employee training. However, there is currently little funding to put forth for these efforts. This grant would greatly support financial supplement needed to enact such remedies and reduce fetal and infant mortality in Wyandotte County.

According to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), Wyandotte County has one of the highest fetal and infant mortality rates within the state of Kansas (7.2 deaths per 1,000 live births; 2017-2021). The Wyandotte County FIMR has also identified that these rates are not the same across all races and ethnicities. In 2020, the Non-Hispanic Black fetal and infant mortality rates was over three times greater compared to Non-Hispanic White and Hispanic or Latino mortality rates. This trend has been similar over the course of FIMR’s lifetime since 2012 and has continued to justify FIMR’s efforts.

With the need for FIMR, reduction in fetal and infant health, and the knowledge on what the CRT and CAT are lacking, the FIMR plans to ask for the following from the grant:

- Coverage for marketing materials for CRT and CAT
- Coverage for Grief Packet materials for CRT
- Coverage for event marketing materials for CRT and CAT
- Coverage for Resource Packet materials for CRT and CAT
- Coverage for Safe Sleep events where a Pack-N-Play and Sleep Sack are given to participants.
- Coverage for Pack-N-Play and Sleep Sack resources distribute to families in need.
- Coverage for a Bereavement event which includes dedicated bereavement sites.
- Coverage for Bereavement Baskets for the event and for parental interviews conducted by the CRT.
- Coverage for the FIMR CAT coordinator so that general funds may be allocated back to the Health Department
- Coverage for the International Perinatal Bereavement Conference to be attended by the CRT and CAT coordinators.

All asks include a timeline, budget, objective tracking, and write up to ensure the grant is used properly and precisely. The grant plans to announce recipients December 15th, 2023. Funds and initiatives must be used by the last day of June in 2024. During the time that initiatives will be taking place, there will be required meetings by recipients to explain progress and outcomes to the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention as well as other grant recipients. Trainings and supplementary sources, based upon the initiatives and asks of the grant, may also be provided by the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention during the initiatives time period.

Title: Wyandotte County Health Department LEPP Grant for repair/replacement of failing onsite wastewater systems and private water well testing - KDHE

BACKGROUND:

- There are many communities across Kansas that have onsite wastewater systems in need of repair and/or replacement. This can cause untreated or inadequately treated wastewater to surface and run off into surface water or to seep into and contaminate the groundwater. The presence of coliform bacteria or high nitrate levels makes drinking water unsafe for human consumption. High specific conductivity is an indicator of higher levels of other mineral contaminants in the water.
- Environmental Inspections oversees all septic work in Wyandotte County. We provide regulatory services for new construction and repairs, replacements, or additions to existing systems.
- There are large areas, often densely populated, that rely on private on-site wastewater management systems and do not have access to city sewers currently. Often the existing systems that begin to fail are outdated, overutilized or the property does not have the proper footprint for a traditional system.
- The Health Department works with Alfred Benesch and Co to provide proposal reviews, corrections, and inspections. Benesch is able to provide design reviews from a professional engineer and helps supplement inspections as current staffing cannot meet the demand.
- Septic systems are a costly essential and are required to be maintained and kept in sanitary conditions. The expense can cause great financial struggles for the property owners and leads to fear of losing their residence if it is deemed unfit due to unhealthy conditions.
- The Health Department averages around 100 septic permits a year. This number has increased since 2020 from an average of 70 permits a year.

The Wyandotte County Health Department wishes to apply for the grant “Wyandotte County LEPP Grant to address repair/replacement of failing onsite wastewater systems and private water well testing in the amount of \$50,000 for a period beginning 11/1/2023 and ending 6/30/2024. The project will focus on septic tanks in need of repair or replacement and water wells in need of yearly testing in Wyandotte County, Kansas, specifically within low-income communities.

This grant will help accomplish long term goals: Minimum Standards for Design and Construction of Onsite Wastewater Systems including,

1. Quality of surface and groundwater is protected for drinking water, recreation, aquatic life support, irrigation, and industrial uses.

2. A breeding place or habitat will not be created for insects, rodents, and other vectors that may later contact food, people, pets, or drinking water.
3. Wastewater will not be exposed on the ground surface where it can be contacted by children and/or pets, creating a significant health hazard.
4. State and federal laws and local regulations governing water pollution or wastewater disposal will be met.
5. Nuisance conditions or obnoxious odors and unsightliness will be avoided.

This grant will cover 85% of onsite wastewater system repair/replacement costs for households with income between 134% and 200% of the 2023 federal poverty level. This grant will cover 100% of onsite wastewater system repair/replacement costs for households with income of 133% or less of the 2023 federal poverty level. The county will be responsible for distributing the funds to the appropriate licensed installers. The county will also be responsible for inspecting the septic tanks and lateral fields to approve repair/replacement of those systems as well as making sure the septic systems are complying with the county sanitary code. The county will develop an agreement with the homeowner so that the repaired/replaced system is operated and maintained properly.

The first objective is to improve community public health and water quality throughout low-income communities in Wyandotte County, Kansas. Many individuals in these communities would not be able to repair or replace a septic system without significant financial help. By improving individual failing septic systems, less wastewater will contaminate local water supplies, properties, and streams. This would improve overall public health because there will be a lower risk of contamination in both surface and ground water. The goal of each county that receives this grant will be to have most septic tank issues solved, leaving the septic tanks in working order and up to county code. By improving sanitation and water quality in these communities, we can improve standards of living. Those in low-income communities face many environmental and socioeconomic stressors. By ensuring that their wastewater is properly treated, these communities will see a decrease in environmental stressors.

The second objective of this grant is to improve community public health and water quality throughout low-income communities in Wyandotte County, Kansas. The additional goal of improving water quality for the communities is to make sure wells are not contaminated by coliform bacteria and nitrates. Specific conductivity is correlated to other mineral contaminants and could alert the well owner that more testing is needed. If tests do come back positive, the well owners need to be made aware of disinfection and treatment protocols. By improving water quality in these communities, we can improve standards of living. Those in low-income communities face many environmental and socioeconomic stressors. By confirming that their drinking water is safe, or by alerting them to the need for treatment to ensure safety, these communities will see a decrease in environmental stressors.

All asks include a timeline, budget, objective tracking, and write up to ensure the grant is used properly and precisely. Wyandotte County LEPP Grant for repair/replacement of failing onsite wastewater systems and private water well testing

This Project Implementation Plan will help accomplish the long-term goals established in Kansas' Nonpoint Source Management Plan including:

1. No lake, river, stream or wetland has a violation of Kansas Surface Water Quality Standards due to nonpoint sources of pollutants and all designated uses are fully supported.
2. Kansas surface and ground water are protected from all nonpoint pollutant sources through the use of recommended water quality best management practices.
3. Kansas Water Plan objectives are achieved by:
 - a. Reducing the levels of pathogens, biochemical oxygen demand, dissolved solids, nutrients, and sediment that adversely affect the water quality of Kansas lakes, rivers, streams and wetlands.
 - b. Reducing the levels of dissolved solids, and nitrates that adversely affect the quality of Kansas ground water.
 - c. Maintaining water quality conditions for unimpaired waters at a level equal to or better than existing conditions.

This grant will help accomplish long term goals established in Bulletin 4-2: Minimum Standards for Design and Construction of Onsite Wastewater Systems including,

1. Quality of surface and groundwater is protected for drinking water, recreation, aquatic life support, irrigation, and industrial uses.
2. A breeding place or habitat will not be created for insects, rodents, and other vectors that may later contact food, people, pets, or drinking water.
3. Wastewater will not be exposed on the ground surface where it can be contacted by children and/or pets, creating a significant health hazard.
4. State and federal laws and local regulations governing water pollution or wastewater disposal will be met.
5. Nuisance conditions or obnoxious odors and unsightliness will be avoided.

This grant will also help accomplish long term goals established in the US EPA Safe Drinking Water Standard and K.S.A. 65-171m including.

1. A legal limit (maximum) on contaminants in drinking water.
2. Establish the requirements for adequate monitoring, by keeping private water wells safe to drink for communities who rely solely on their wells for their water supplies and by testing for coliform bacteria, nitrates, and specific conductivity.

Implementation Plan

Describe the water quality problems/issues being addressed

There are many communities across Kansas that have onsite wastewater systems in need of repair and/or replacement. This can cause untreated or inadequately treated wastewater to surface and run off into surface water or to seep into and contaminate the groundwater. The presence of coliform bacteria or high nitrate levels makes drinking water unsafe for human consumption. High specific conductivity is an indicator of higher levels of other mineral contaminants in the water.

Goal One

Provide funding for landowners to repair/replace their septic systems that are no longer meeting the standards in Bulletin 4-2 and/or the Wyandotte County Sanitary Code.

Methods

This grant will cover 85% of onsite wastewater system repair/replacement costs for households with income between 134% and 200% of the 2023 federal poverty level. This grant will cover 100% of onsite wastewater system repair/replacement costs for households with income of 133% or less of the 2023 federal poverty level. The county will be responsible for distributing the funds to the appropriate licensed installers. The county will also be responsible for inspecting the septic tanks and lateral fields to approve repair/replacement of those systems as well as making sure the septic systems are complying with the county sanitary code. The county will develop an agreement with the homeowner so that the repaired/replaced system is operated and maintained properly.

Objectives

The objective of Goal One is to improve community public health and water quality throughout low-income communities in Wyandotte County, Kansas. Many individuals in these communities would not be able to repair or replace a septic system without significant financial help. By improving individual failing septic systems, less wastewater will contaminate local water supplies, properties, and streams. This would improve overall public health because there will be a lower risk of contamination in both surface and ground water. The goal of each county that receives this grant will be to have most septic tank issues solved, leaving the septic tanks in working order and up to county code. By improving sanitation and water quality in these communities, we can improve standards of living. Those in low-income communities face many environmental and socioeconomic stressors. By ensuring that their wastewater is properly treated, these communities will see a decrease in environmental stressors.

Goal Two

Assist well owners to test their private water wells for nitrates, coliform bacteria, and specific conductivity.

Methods

Well owners will be provided a sampling kit and will collect a sample of their private drinking water well following KDHE and/or county instructions. Landowners will then deliver samples to the county, who will send samples and payment to a KDHE certified laboratory. The county will share results with the well owner.
